Good afternoon. I would like to thank the members of the Appropriations and Financial Affairs committee for hearing our testimony regarding LD2214. My name is Meghan Cookson, and I have worked for the State of Maine for almost 2 years. Prior to starting at the Office of Chief Medical Examiner (OCME), I was a dispatcher for the Maine State Police for a year. On October 25th, 2023, when the Lewiston Mass Casualty happened, I immediately thought of my fellow first responders. I can imagine it was one of the worst days of their career. The worst day of my career in dispatch was December 10th, 2022.

On December 10th, 2022, 4 students at Maine Maritime Academy tragically lost their lives when the car they were traveling in left the roadway and erupted into flames. These students were the same age as me. Few things are more heartbreaking than having to explain to family members that their loved one has to be identified through DNA. I now have those tough conversations with families every day.

When a mass casualty happens in another state, their first thought is probably not "how am I going to pay for 19 autopsies, 19 transports, 19 toxicology reports, and near around the clock overtime?" But that was an immediate concern for this office. According to a report from the Department of Justice, the average budget for a State Medical Examiner's Office was \$5.8 million dollars in 2018. Our budget of \$2.6 million dollars was less than half the average, and that was 6 years ago.

The Lewiston Mass Casualty Event should have broken our office. We had more victims than we have employees, there are 12 of us for the entire state. Despite being underfunded and understaffed, we got the job done, and showed the utmost professionalism in doing so.

When I transferred from dispatch to the OCME, I foolishly assumed that we too qualified for Maine's 1998 Special Retirement plan. When the Lewiston Mass Casualty began to unfold, people began calling 911; dispatch answers the call, they have special retirement. Maine State Police responded to the scene; they have special retirement. Evidence is collected and taken to the Crime Lab; they have special retirement. The deceased are then transported to OCME for autopsy, but we don't have special retirement?

My colleagues have been fighting for you to fund LD610 for three years now, which would allow OCME to take part in Maine's 1998 Special Retirement plan. I am happy to join in that fight; all we are asking for is equality.

If the state can find 6 million dollars to "provide[s] one-time funding to provide support to victims of crimes," (page A-45) I struggle to understand why you can't find \$370,404 dollars to support those who determine the cause of death of said victims of crime.

This bill includes General Fund appropriations of \$370,404 in fiscal year 2023-24 and \$33,191 in fiscal year 2024-25 and Federal Expenditures Fund allocations of \$923 in fiscal year 2023-24 and \$1,244 in fiscal year 2024-25 for the costs of allowing employees of the Office of Chief Medical Examiner to participate in the 1998 Special Plan. Of these amounts, a one-time General Fund appropriation of \$346,502 in fiscal year 2023-24 is provided to the Retirement System - Retirement Allowance Fund within the Maine Public Employees Retirement System for the unfunded actuarial liability created as a result of allowing service retirement benefits for these employees earned under the regular state employee and teacher plan to be calculated under the 1998 Special Plan. Additionally, ongoing General Fund appropriations of \$23,902 and \$33,191 and Federal Expenditures Fund allocations of \$923 and \$1,244 in fiscal years 2023-24 and 2024-25, respectively, is provided to the Office of Chief Medical Examiner within the Department of the Attorney General for the prospective costs of moving the positions to the 1998 Special Plan effective October 1, 2023.
