Testimony of Laura Mitchell, Executive Director of the Maine Affordable Housing Coalition, March 1, 2024

in favor of the Supplemental Budget LD2214, Part DD, Office of Community Affairs

Good afternoon, Senator Rotundo, Representative Sachs, and members of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs; and Senator Nangle, Representative Stover, and members of the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government.

My name is Laura Mitchell. I am the Executive Director of the Maine Affordable Housing Coalition. MAHC is a nonprofit organization with 140 member businesses and nonprofits working to design, develop, engineer, finance, and build affordable homes for all Maine people.

Our coalition supports Part DD in the proposed supplemental budget that creates the Office of Community Affairs. We see this reorganization as a vital step in aligning resources, technical assistance and expertise toward achieving shared goals across levels of government in Maine. This will support our economy, and help build the foundation our whole state relies on – housing for all people in Maine.

Maine's land and people are under pressure. Maine has seen record population growthin the last few years, which our aging state desperately needs. But our state housing study shows we are short 38,000 homes right now, and needs another 40,000 by 2030. With that has come 4,000+ people experiencing homelessness, 25,000 people on waitlists for rental assistance, and a current pace of housing development that doesn't meet the need.

There is a mismatch between state and local work to create a thriving state. Next week three towns are holding local referendums on whether to allow desperately needed development of affordable housing projects. Meanwhile, the state is investing record levels in building this housing, developing a housing production plan, and offering grants to communities to update land use codes to allow housing.

The new Office of Community Affairs will create one stop for coordinated and efficient planning, technical assistance, and financial support for municipalities to better plan for challenges, pursue solutions, and create stronger, more resilient Maine communities.

Municipalities need support and the state needs to be there in an easily accessible structure to plan for growth, pursue federal funding, fill their workforce, and meet the new challenges climate change are creating. This office can provide that support.

For these reasons, MAHC is excited to support the creation of the Office of Community Affairs as proposed in Part DD. Thank you for this opportunity to share our testimony today.
