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## Testimony In Opposition

## LD 2238, An Act to Address Gun Violence in Maine by Requiring a Waiting Period for Certain Firearm Purchases

# Before the Joint Standing Committee on Judiciary

## March 7, 2023

Senator Carney, Representative Moonen, and honorable members of the Joint Standing Committee on Judiciary, my name is Kim Moulton. I live in Fairfield, Maine and I am writing in opposition to LD 2238, An Act to Address Gun Violence in Maine by Requiring a Waiting Period for Certain Firearm Purchases.

While I suspect the sponsors of this bill may have good intentions, the claimed potential benefits do not outweigh the known risks of depriving law-abiding citizens their right to purchase a firearm when they have already been cleared in an FBI background check.

As you may know, police are under no obligation to protect citizens. Consider the following court cases:

The U.S. Supreme Court, in 2005 in *Castle Rock v. Gonzales*, Justices held that the police had no such duty when they failed to protect her from her husband after he violated a restraining order, abducted, and later killed their three children.

In 1981, the case *Warren v. District of Columbia*, the D.C. Court of Appeals held that "no specific legal duty exists" to protect an individual (unless there is a special relationship between an officer and an individual, such as a person in custody).

Carol Brown, a 39-year-old woman living in New Jersey secured a restraining order, but she knew a firearm was her best option for protection from her former boyfriend, who she believed intended to kill her and who she knew had a history of violence. New Jersey had many such "good intention" laws. Lawmakers delayed her civil rights – only temporarily. While she waited the random number of days, she installed cameras and kept her doors locked. She fought for her life, but he killed her while she waited - an arbitrary number of days - to exercise her right to protect her own life.

There is insufficient evidence and no justification to delay the transfer of a firearm to a lawful purchaser. I urge you to report "Ought Not To Pass", to preserve a citizens civil right to protect their life.
