The current absence of such limitations creates an environment where businesses might face an undue burden from constant audits, possibly risking their operation. By prescribing a reasonable cap, the legislation acknowledges the need for oversight while actively protecting businesses from being buried under the weight of incessant regulatory scrutiny. This adjustment not only enhances the practicality of compliance but also supports the sustainable development of the cannabis industry. Seeds and seedlings, recognized as hemp by the DEA and federally legal, should not be subject to unnecessary regulation within the cannabis industry. Aligning Maine law with federal law in this regard is a sensible move that eliminates this unnecessary hurdle. The Office of Cannabis Policy should refrain from exerting jurisdiction over genetics, acknowledging that these elements fall under federal purview. By exempting seeds and seedlings from undue regulation, LD 40 ensures that the cannabis industry operates in harmony with established federal guidelines, fostering a smoother and more logical regulatory landscape that supports the growth and development of the industry. The demand for individual identification cards for employees of cannabis businesses continues to stand out as not only impractical but downright absurd.
