As a now twenty-two-yearold, Criminal Justice major at Central Maine Community College, I understand that trampling on the rights of law-abiding citizens will not stop those who wish to do harm to themselves and others. I am currently taking a Civil Liberties course which I am learning about how the government does not have the right to infringe on people's constitutional rights. Furthermore, not everyone who has mental health problems will commit gun violence. Also, this bill is discriminatory against those with mental health problems. I believe that there are better solutions. I believe that we need to get more mental health professionals in this state. Let's be proactive with children and teach them self-defense during gym class rather than just running which they will be able to use all throughout their life because let's face it gun violence is not the only type of violence out there.
