Senator Grohoski, Representative Perry and members of the Joint Standing Committee on Taxation. My name is Michael Bourque. I am a resident of Portland. I am the President and CEO of MEMIC and most importantly for this hearing a Portland Sea Dogs fan. Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony in support of LD 2258.

As is the case with life, and career development for that matter, you never know where your experiences will take you. Our interests and pursuits take us from one place to another and eventually you find yourself in a place you never thought you'd be. I'm no stranger to that experience. If you would have told me nearly three decades ago that I would be the President of an insurance company, I wouldn't have believed you.
