Testimony in Support: LD 2283 An Act to Enact Crisis Intervention Order Act to Protect the Safety of the Public

April 5th, 2024

Senator Carney, Representative Moonen and esteemed members of the Judiciary Committee, my name is Victoria Libby. I live in South Portland, and I am a clinical psychologist here in Maine.

As a mental health practitioner I have seen firsthand the impact of gun violence. The trauma it inflicts is not just physical but psychological and these psychological wounds are widespread and insidious. Basic gun safety regulation is a vital step in preventative health care for our state.

I write to you today in support of LD 2283. This bill empowers family members and law enforcement to petition the courts to temporarily

remove firearms from individuals who pose a risk of harming themselves or others without the need for protective custody or a mental health determination which has historically lead to longer periods before the gun can be removed which in turn increases risk for suicide and homicide.

The intensity of the impulse to hurt oneself or others is often transient. For this reason there is a critical window in which having access to a gun is particularly dangerous. We need a fast process to temporarily remove a gun from someone who is struggling with this intent. These orders have proven to be effective in preventing tragedies by temporarily disarming

individuals in crisis.

Our yellow flag law requires a psychiatric evaluation before a judge can be asked to put through a court order. This creates more red tape and more time in which a person who is a risk to themselves or others can carry out a shooting. A study from UC Davis showed that the red flag law (also known as Extreme Risk Protection Order) was effectively used in 58 cases of

individuals threatening mass shootings in California in the last three years. Had an extreme risk protection order like this one been in place in Maine, rather than our yellow flag law, the police would have had the legal tools

they needed to remove Robert Card's weapons from his home.
