I oppose LD 210 "An Act Making Unified Appropriations and Allocations from the General Fund and Other Funds for the Expenditures of State Government and Changing Certain Provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 2025, June 30, 2026 and June 30, 2027", and it "ought not to pass".

I see a proposed \$11.6 billion biennial budget for fiscal years 2026-2027.
