AMENDED TESTIMONY of Laura Mitchell, Executive Director of the Maine Affordable Housing Coalition, 2.24.25 NEITHER FOR NOR AGAINST LD210 the Budget

Good afternoon, Senator Rotundo, Representative Gattine, and members of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs; and Senator Curry, Representative Gere, and members of the Joint Standing Committee on Housing and Economic Development.

My name is Laura Mitchell. I am the Executive Director of the Maine Affordable Housing Coalition. MAHC is a nonprofit with 140 member organizations working to create and preserve affordable homes for all Maine people. MAHC, and the thousands of people that live in affordable housing in Maine, would like to thank the State for their unprecedented investments in housing recently.

We applaud the inclusion in this budget of \$3 million to the fund to preserve manufactured home parks in Maine. This program has saved more than 400 affordable homes for Maine people and is vital to keeping people housed.

Investments in building housing over the last few years has created the largest ever pipeline of 3,000 affordable homes under construction at Maine Housing. But these investments were only one time disbursements. Of concern is that this budget actually cuts funding to Maine Housing's HOME Fund, that will force program cuts and reduce the state's leverage in bringing in outside investment for housing. We strongly urge the committee to not cut the HOME Fund.

Our state's economy and health can't be sustained resting on a pipeline of 3,000 homes, because we need 80,000 new homes for our residents and future workforce. Without additional funding, the construction of affordable homes will dramatically decrease.

Further, there are two notably successful Maine Housing programs that will end this spring without new, additional funding – the Rural Affordable Rental Housing Program, and the Affordable Home Ownership Program. These programs have built homes from Aroostook County to York County and everywhere inbetween. In this final round of applications, we can see that projects are shovel ready, but just need some state funding to get built. The Rural Program had \$51 million in requests from housing projects, but only has \$25 million to distribute. The Home Ownership Program has projects that need \$13 million to get built, but only \$10 million to spend. These programs will end and shovel ready homes won't get built. That's a economic blow to towns throughout Maine. Housing is the SOLUTION for Maine's economy and health, and we need to find long-term, sustainable sources of funding to invest in the housing solution.

MAHC is also concerned about access to the continuum of affordable housing due to the suggested 3-month limit on General Assistance for housing. General Assistance is the primary tool left to move people out of emergency shelters into rentals, and landlords won't sign leases for 3 months. This will clog the emergency shelter system, push more people outside, create instability for landlords, and force increased evictions. Maine's housing continuum is under dire pressure and this will make it worse.

Finally, MAHC supports Part D of the budget that creates the Maine Office of Community Affairs.

MAHC looks forward to discussing options for long-term investments in housing in the coming months. Thank you for this opportunity to share our testimony today.

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
