TESTIMONY NEITHER FOR NOR AGAINST

L.D. 537

AN ACT TO PROHIBIT THE DOXING OF A MINOR AND TO AUTHORIZE A RELATED CIVIL ACTION

March 3, 2025

Senator Carney, Representative Kuhn and members of the Judiciary Committee, I am Eileen King, the executive director of the Maine School Superintendents Association, testifying on behalf of the MSSA Legislative Committee neither for nor against L.D. 537, *An Act to Prohibit the Doxing of a Minor and to Authorize a Related Civil Action*.

MSSA appreciates the Legislature's recognition of the serious risks doxing poses to minors. The unauthorized disclosure of personal identifying information, as defined in L.D. 537, can lead to targeted harassment, intimidation, threats, and real-world harm to students and their families.

Current Maine laws recognize the severity of similar offenses:

- Stalking (17-A MRSA §210-A) criminalizes conduct that causes a person to fear for their safety, which aligns with the definition of doxing in L.D. 537.
- Harassment (17-A MRSA §506-A) penalizes repeated, unwanted communication that intimidates or alarms the victim.
- Maine's Bullying Law (20-A MRSA §6554) requires schools to intervene when bullying causes emotional distress or disrupts a student's education—circumstances that are often the result of doxing incidents.

As education leaders, we have seen how online threats create significant safety concerns, disrupt school environments, and contribute to severe emotional and psychological distress for students.

We unfortunately saw this play out just last month in MSAD 51, when the high school was forced to add extra security measures following the doxing of an athlete there. When this happens, it affects everyone. Students, teachers and staff are more anxious and on alert. It inhibits students' mental health, worsens the school climate, and makes it harder to learn.
