I am Eileen King, the executive director for the Maine School Superintendents Association, testifying on behalf of the legislative committee of the Maine School Superintendents Association neither for nor against L.D. 168.

Ensuring the safety of every single student and staff member is the number one priority for our school leaders. Towards that goal, Maine districts have invested in many new safety initiatives, from building enhancements and notification systems to "badges" that staff can press to call for help.

We also work closely with local law enforcement to ensure appropriate procedures are in place to quickly respond to an emergency, protect our students and quickly notify families. Schools have detailed emergency protocols which are regularly updated through community collaboration. We support the use of any new technologies to complement these efforts and increase communication.

However, our association has two primary concerns regarding the policy proposed in this bill. First, the legislation would seem to require every school to implement a very specific type of silent alert system. We have concerns about a law requiring such a narrowly defined solution, which could limit our local districts' flexibility in choosing and purchasing a system that best meets the unique needs of their communities.

We also worry about the cost. Some estimates place the cost of implementing this system at upwards of \$8,000 per school, adding substantial expenses that are not covered through state assistance.

This bill also requires that, in addition to notifying school personnel and law enforcement, the system "must automatically notify parents of students who subscribe to be notified" when it is activated. Communication with families during an emergency is of utmost importance to our schools, but we worry that this type of automatic notification could result in families overwhelming our phone lines or rushing to school buildings during the initial, critical moments when school personnel and law enforcement are responding to an emergency. This could potentially impede the work of our staff and law enforcement partners in protecting our children.

Again, our school leaders support any tools to better protect our students, and many districts have already purchased their own notification systems towards that goal. Thank you for your time.
