Re: LD 814 – An Act to Provide Funding to Area Agencies on Aging for Community-based Services and Programs to Support Older Adults

Senator Ingwersen, Representative Meyer and members of the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services, thank you for the opportunity to provide information neither for nor against LD 814, *An Act to Provide Funding to Area Agencies on Aging for Community-based Services and Programs to Support Older Adults*.

This bill amends current state statutes regarding services for older adults to specifically list case management and navigation services. It also increases ongoing state appropriations by \$9.75 million annually for all services offered by Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) across Maine.

The Department agrees that older Mainers and their family caregivers have unmet needs, as described in the Maine State Plan on Aging Needs Assessment. However, the Department cannot verify the origin or calculation of the amount included in this bill. The Department currently awards \$12,129,763 in ongoing funds (\$7,069,218 federal and \$5,060,545 state) to support the programs and services managed by the AAAs. This includes the recent increases in ongoing state funding proposed by Governor Mills and approved by the 131<sup>st</sup> Legislature for home-delivered meals (\$2,649,301 per year) and information and assistance services (\$500,000 per year).

The Department views the proposed statutory changes in this bill as unnecessary, given that they are duplicative of existing federal regulations under the Older Americans Act that govern activities of AAAs (see 42 U.S.C., Ch. 35, §3030d(a)(5)(A)). Should the Legislature approve this bill, any inconsistencies between federal and state definitions for these services is likely to increase administrative burden for the Department and AAAs by leading to parallel programs, each with its own requirements and reporting, for services that are very similar.
