Re: LD 776, An Act to Provide Free School Lunches to Special Purpose Private Schools That Receive Students from the Public School System

To: Senator Rafferty, Representative Murphy, and members of the Education and Cultural Affairs Committee

The Maine Chapter of the Freedom From Religion Foundation (MC-FFRF) writes in SUPPORT of LD 776.

Access to nutritious meals is a fundamental part of ensuring that students are able to learn in the classroom. School lunches have long been recognized as a vital component of a child's daily well-being, promoting not only physical health but also academic success. In Maine, the expansion of free school lunch programs to special purpose private schools is a much-needed step in creating a more equitable educational environment for all students.
