

## TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION TO LD 1257 An Act Regarding Labeling of Genetically Engineered Food Products

Senator Talbot-Ross, Representative Pluecker, and honorable members of the Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry:

My name is Julie Ann Smith, and I am the Executive Director of the Maine Farmers Coalition, a collective of progressive farmers deeply committed to ensuring the sustainable growth and protection of Maine's vital farming industry.

We strongly oppose the proposed legislation. With developments in agri-science and robust research and development occurring worldwide, the use of genetic engineering has created numerous advantages for farmers while also keeping food affordable. Genetic engineering has helped reduce pesticide use by creating disease and pest resistance, increasing yields, and, perhaps most importantly, improving both mental and physical human health.<sup>1</sup> It is critical for Maine farmers to have access to and use of the same technologies and tools that other states and neighboring countries do.

Requiring the labeling of genetically engineered food implies there is something potentially dangerous with the use of genetic engineering. As we saw with the labeling of rBST in milk many years ago, such labels create significant consumer confusion and distrust. There are options for consumers who wish to have information about the use of genetic engineering that do not require yet another burden on farmers.

Furthermore, we question how the state of Maine will be able to enforce packaging for food imported from other states or countries. We believe this bill would unfairly target Maine farmers and create yet another impediment for the commercial sale of the food we are growing in our state.
