Thousands of coyotes are slaughtered every year in senseless killing contests, a cruel sport often touted as population control, when in fact these acts of cruelty serve no purpose but to provide entertainment for those involved. Additionally, the knock-on effects to the ecosystem from wildlife-killing contests are profound.
