What do I tell them when they ask me if the kids in Palestine are safe yet, and why our leaders aren't doing everything in their power to keep them alive? How can it be that to simply condemn the acts of a government, a military, to recognize and acknowledge the horror that has taken place in Palestine is anything but an act of love, a plea, a desperate call to protect all children. Why is it OK to condemn one genocide and not another? The weaponization of Antisemitism intensifies discrimination and exclusion of vulnerable communities in this country. Holding hands with ALL makes us ALL safer. No one is safer when we silence and disappear those who dare to share their own story of grief, pain, horror as they watch members of their family, friends, community slaughtered and wiped out. No one is safer when we fail to learn from history. No one is safer if we allow this bill to pass. No one is safer.
