Zionism is the belief the Jewish people have the right to self-determination in their ancestral homeland. Zionism has been a central tenet of Judaism for thousands of years. Connection to the Land is at the heart of Judaism with her festivals tied to the agricultural seasons in the Land of Israel, celebrated by Jews in Maine to this day.

Although most Jews were forcibly exiled from the Land of Israel after conquest by Rome in 70 CE, a significant number of Jews remained in the Galilee writing the Mishnah to the 5th century CE. Recent polling of 600 four year US colleges by the University of Chicago found that "66% of Jewish college students understand the chant 'Free Palestine from the River to the Sea' means the expulsion and genocide of Israeli Jews. 62% of Jewish students report fear for their safety.

Anti-semitism is cloaked in critiques of Israeli government and her supporters, claiming they don't have any issue with Jews; rather, their problem is with Zionists, a catch-all for anyone who supports the Jewish state. Yes. Anti-Zionism is a form of anti-semitism.
