OPPOSING LD 1523, "An Act to Improve Perinatal Care Through Expanded Access to Doula Services"

Before the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services Hearing: April 17, 2025 at 1:00 p.m.

Dear Chair Ingwersen, Chair Meyer, and distinguished members of the Committee on Health and Human Services,

The Maine State Nurses Association/National Nurses Organizing Committee/National Nurses United (MSNA), representing more than 4,000 registered nurses and health care professionals providing patient care in our state, **urges the Committee to oppose LD** 1523. While MSNA supports providing additional services to MaineCare participants, it is premature to set specific requirements for MaineCare reimbursement for doula services without specifying what qualifications are necessary for a doula to be eligible for reimbursement or what services are appropriate for a doula to provide.

While doulas can provide valuable emotional support, physical comfort, and connection to resources, it is essential to ensure that health-related advice and patient education are provided by licensed health care professionals as the perinatal period involves many complex health issues. Health teaching and health counseling are important parts of a registered nurse's scope of practice under Maine's Nurse Practice Act.¹ The patient education provided by registered nurses is informed by nursing education and experience and tailored to the health issues of each patient. Doulas can help their clients learn about and access health care services, including health education, from licensed professionals, but they cannot safely replace those professionals. For example, MaineCare currently offers a MaineMOM program that

appropriately allows certified doulas to work as patient navigators, who coordinate care.²

We urge the Committee to oppose LD 1523. MSNA would appreciate the opportunity to work with the Committee to determine the services that a doula could provide safely.
