Along with our trusted partner organizations Maine Equal Justice and Preble Street Faith Advocacy Network, **the Council supports LD 1522**.

Our faith-based advocacy is guided by our "Moral Agenda." Its guidance is clear: because of our faith, we support policies like LD 1522 that help eliminate hunger and poverty and that benefit the most vulnerable. We advocate for sustainable communities with affordable housing that is accessible to all.
