I have many issues with this proposed bill. This will have severe implications if passed, my thoughts are as follows:

- 4. Inspection Delays: With the state system potentially overburdened due to the volume of animal facilities and reduced staffing, inspection delays could result in prolonged waits for approvals and licenses. This would not only hinder responsible breeders and shelters but also place added stress on pet owners who need their licenses processed quickly to avoid legal issues.
- 5. Loss of Local Control: Municipalities understand their communities' unique needs and challenges better than a centralized state system. Local licensing allows for tailored regulations that effectively manage pet populations, ensure public safety, and maintain community standards. Eliminating local control may lead to a one-size-fits-all approach that doesn't adequately serve the diverse needs of different communities.
- 6. Impact on Local Animal Shelters and Rescues: Local shelters and rescues rely on community support and understanding. If licensing becomes state-run, these organizations could suffer from reduced local funding and support, making it more difficult to operate effectively and care for animals in need.
- 7. Community Participation: Municipal licenses often encourage community engagement and involvement in animal welfare issues. By shifting the system to a state level, opportunities for community-driven initiatives and discussions regarding local animal welfare could diminish.
