Both my daughter, myself, and my nieces have always been incredibly active in team sports. Although my daughter and I never played sports at the collegiate level, my niece attended UMO on a full sports scholarship. We are all very proud of her accomplishments!

At no time during mine, my daughter's, or my niece's athletic adventures where we faced with having to accept a trans-female on our teams. I'm frankly appalled by this new phenomenon of being able to declare a new gender identity and use that personal identity, personal choice to insert yourself into a female safe space. They say the mark of a true leaders is to never ask your team to do anything you wouldn't do yourself. I'm going to ask you as leaders to look around at your committee team and honestly ask yourself if you could beat any of the males in a sport, but just as importantly, are you absolutely comfortable using shared changing spaces. I can say without hesitation, my male co-workers are stronger and more athletically capable than I am and I do not wish, as an adult, to share my locker room with them. If I'm uncomfortable why would I force that situation on minors as "normal".
