LD 1897: Ought to Pass

LD 1897 enables outdoor growers to better compete with indoor growers. Outdoor growers produce only 30% of the yield of indoor growers but face the same licensing requirements. Increasing plant counts for outdoor grower licenses would greatly benefit the industry as a whole. The bill also clarifies outdoor grow classifications, correcting the misclassification of some as indoor grows.

A 30-day grace period for Registered Identification Cards for new hires would greatly benefit the industry. Companies struggle to find workers, and workers often wait a month or more for a card before earning income to support their families.

The bill improves fencing requirements to be more common-sense and practical. It also removes the collective prohibition, allowing growers to collaborate rather than work under a single owner, benefiting the industry as a whole.

LD 1897 provides clearer compliance rules for farm visitors. For example, I could show my parents my garden without violating regulations. Farm tours could generate new revenue for farms. The bill also expands opportunities for consultations, enhancing operational flexibility.
