Senator Carney, Representative Kuhn and members of the Maine Legislative Judiciary Committee, I am Mike McClellan and I live in Raymond, Maine. I am a former Maine State Representative who served in the 125, 126 and 127th Maine Sessions. I can not attend the hearings today but I am here to testify online in strong support for Representative Campbell's bill: An Act to Prohibit Biological Males from Participating in School Athletic Programs and Activities Designated for Females When State Funding Is Provided to the School.

The bill's summary states -This bill prohibits a school administrative unit or an elementary school, secondary school or postsecondary educational institution in the State that receives any state funding from allowing a person whose biological sex assigned at birth is male to participate in an athletic program or activity that is designated for females. Maine's 125th Legislature was in 2010 and 2011. Not a long time ago and yet it seems a universe away.
