Thank you for hearing my voice on these issues today. My name is Jess Huddy — I'm a resident of Waterville, and am writing in strong opposition to LD 1432.

What do we, as a society, have to gain by stripping protections from the Maine Human Rights Act? By removing legal protection from discrimination on the basis of gender identity, we would be making it easier for people to refuse services, housing, etc. to people solely based on who they are. This could have far-reaching effects, allowing people to act out their prejudices — legally — against anyone who doesn't fit their idea of what a woman or a man should be.
