Schools have a powerful influence on building welcoming spaces. This includes opportunities for students to participate as the person they are in all activities. It also includes being able to decide how they identify themselves and what name they would like to be called.

As schools, we should be using every proactive and positive tool we have to protect our students' wellbeing. We should not be enacting laws that put our students at further risk.
