There was a growing movement to do something similar to the proposed bill but it never gained traction. It's because you don't notice the loss until it's gone. One day you look out the window and notice an ugly yellow hue where a beautiful picturesque view used to be. We have an opportunity to preserve the night sky for generations here. Don't let my story become the truth here as it already has for countless other rural communities. Please vote to pass this.
