Testimony of Laura Mitchell, Executive Director, Maine Affordable Housing Coalition, in favor of LD1921- An Act to Create a Statewide Housing Resolution Board, by Representative Gere

Senator Curry, Representative Gere, and Members of the Joint Standing Committee on Housing and Economic Development. I am Laura Mitchell, executive director of the **Maine Affordable Housing Coalition**. I am testifying in favor of LD1921 on behalf of the coalition, a nonprofit with 140 member businesses and more than 2,000 individual members.

LD 1921 provides a process MAHC supports to ensure laws are abided by in the housing approval process. Right now those decisions are being made by volunteers without consistent training. A Housing Resolution Board provides an inexpensive, fast pathway, staffed by experts to provide a pathway for municipalities and developers to stay within the legal framework for approving housing, rather than the emotion driven, non-ordinance related, gray area testimony that volunteers hear from their neighbors at planning board meetings. These pleas are often from a few voices that are comfortably housed and have the resources and acumen to fight housing for the people we need, rely upon and love in our community – like EMS workers, teachers, police officers, childcare workers, medical assistants, and more. Sometimes, even against housing for doctors, lawyers, and other higher income workers.

Building any type of housing in Maine is extremely difficult and expensive. These costs and our home shortage are not isolated to one town or region. It is structural, systemic, and statewide. A statewide solution is needed. Media articles of local housing approval processes being swayed against people with "low-income", or false narratives about school populations, character, etc. run from Kittery, Cape Elizabeth and Cumberland to Kingfield, Bangor, and Greenville. The myths that decisions are made on are not legally binding, force reductions in units, and other project changes that often make them infeasible.

Establishing the Housing Resolution Board is a critical policy step. Without a fair, efficient, and expert appeals process, developers and housing nonprofits will continue to face unpredictable, costly legal battles even when they meet all local and state requirements.

Both New Hampshire and Connecticut show us that a housing resolution board is a proven approach for balancing local review with the urgent need for statewide housing production. This bill would bring us up to speed with regional peers who recognize that predictable, fast, and fair land use review processes are essential for solving a statewide housing crisis. These housing boards have increased housing production, ensured due process, and limited costly litigation across New England, whilst delivering findings equally in favor of municipalities and developers.

For example, in NH the board provides a much faster, more thorough, less expensive, more responsive, more transparent, and much less intimidating alternative to Superior Court. Superior Court also generally prioritizes criminal cases over land use, unnecessarily dragging out the timeline for their land use decisions.

No Superior Court judge or clerk has the breadth or depth of expertise in the disciplines represented by members of the proposed Housing Resolution Board - land use attorney, professional engineer/or surveyor - bringing years of specialized experience and expertise to bear on every mediation. Housing is a priority in every district in Maine. This Board would be the only State center dedicated to facilitating and expediting review of local housing decisions in accordance with existing statutes and local ordinances. Please support this bill, we can't continue to invest in housing only to have it squandered in decision making processes.
