Senator Carney, Representative Kuhn, and esteemed members of the Judiciary Committee:

My name is Pamela Jackson, a resident of South Portland, ME, and a member of the Allen Avenue Unitarian Universalist Church in Portland where social justice issues are extremely important. I am testifying in support of LD 1971 An Act to Protect Workers in This State by Clarifying the Relationship of State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies with Federal Immigration Authorities.

This bill interests me because it is essential to the safety and well being of the people of our state. All people in Maine need to be supported in seeking safety, health, and educational opportunities, so law enforcement, health care facilities, and schools must remain spaces they can access without fear of retaliation. The actions that ICE has been taking over the last months are unconstitutional because they deny due process to people who are living in our country.

LD 1971 protects public safety by clearly defining the role of Maine law enforcement and state employees. It ensures local officers focus on local priorities and maintains the trust communities need to keep everyone safe.

For these reasons, I urge the committee to vote Ought to Pass on LD 1971.
