**Re: Testimony in Support of LD 1911:  
*An Act to Automatically Seal Criminal History Record Information for Certain Crimes***

To Senator Carney, Representative Kuhn, and distinguished members of the Joint Standing Committee on Judiciary,

My name is Kinna Thakarar, and I am writing to **support LD 1911**. I am an addiction medicine and infectious disease (ID) physician at MaineHealth. I have been practicing medicine for 17 years, have lived in Maine for a decade, and deeply care about our community. I currently serve on several national task forces for ID and addiction professional societies, have presented nationally and internationally on ID/substance use issues, and am the principal investigator of two federally funded and state-funded overdose prevention grants.

In Maine, about 25% of adults live with a past legal record, or more than 271,000 people, creating lasting barriers to jobs, housing, and education that remain long after serving their sentence. **Many of these records are for low-level, nonviolent offenses that continue to limit access to jobs, housing, and education long after sentences are served.** I have sadly seen community partners that I work with, and patients that I care for, struggle with this issue. While many of the community partners I work with are still doing amazing work & keeping people healthy and safe despite these barriers, many other individuals struggle to find work, housing, and food security. As a researcher, we also face barriers in terms of who we can hire, even if they are a good fit for the job.

As a person of color, I think it is important to consider the racial disparities that occur without full and automatic sealing. **Automated record sealing can remedy some of the consequences that result from Black and low-income Mainers being disparately affected by conviction records.** According to data from the Prison *Policy Institute*, Black people in Maine are incarcerated at a rate 9.2 times higher than white people. Automating the process reduces racial and economic disparities to relief.

For the reasons listed above, among several other reasons which I am sure will be discussed today, I urge you to vote "ought to pass" for LD1911.
