I am writing in support of this Bill.

These federal actions do not arrive quietly.  
They move through our communities as fear —  
splitting families, hollowing trust,  
teaching people to look over their shoulders  
in places meant for care, learning, and refuge.  
When intimidation takes root, participation withers.  
Silence spreads. That, too, is a consequence.

Maine does not have to accept this.

LD 2106 would place a necessary boundary around our shared spaces.  
It would require judicial oversight before immigration enforcement can enter schools,  
hospitals, healthcare facilities, daycares, or libraries.  
It would protect private records when agents step beyond public doors.  
It would say that power must answer to law.

Every Mainer — regardless of immigration status — deserves the ordinary freedoms  
that make a life possible:

to learn, to heal, to read, to exist in public without fear.

Safety should not be conditional.

Dignity should not be negotiable.

LD 2106 is an affirmation that Maine chooses care over coercion,  
and community over fear.
