My concern is the use of the term “emergency medical services educator.” Maine EMS recognizes “Instructor Coordinator” as its EMS education license. “Emergency medical services educator” encompasses many more groups than “Instructor Coordinator.”

As a contributing author of the Maine EMS Training Center Standards, we never intended this license to apply to all “EMS educators.” We intentionally moved away from designating all educators as “Instructor Coordinators” because other health professions (nurses, physicians, physician assistants, respiratory therapists) do not license instructors separately. Police and firefighters also do not require a “license” to teach within their professions. We were also concerned that all of these professionals may be precluded from teaching EMS education if we were too prescriptive.

We should move away from the multiple licenses Maine EMS continues to add for Community Paramedicine (CP) and Instructor Coordinators and adopt a model used by other healthcare and public safety professions. We license EMS clinicians and, through EMS agencies and Training Centers, recognize that their professional licensure extends into these realms, per agency and training center rules and licensing.
