Testimony of Anne L. Head, Commissioner Department of Professional and Financial Regulation

March 1, 2023

Before the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs and the Joint Standing Committee on Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services

LD 258 "An Act Making Unified Appropriations and Allocations from the General Fund and Other Funds for the Expenditures of State Government and Changing Certain provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 2023, June 30, 2024 and June 30, 2025"

Good morning, Senator Rotundo, Representative Sachs, and Members of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs; Senator Bailey, Representative Perry, and members of the Joint Standing Committee on Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services. My name is Anne Head, and I am the Commissioner of the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation. I am here today to testify in support of the Governor's biennial budget bill, LD 221.

This budget advances the Governor's guiding belief that to build a stronger, more prosperous state where opportunity is available to all, then we must invest in the infrastructure that supports the people of Maine, our greatest asset.

That is why this budget proposal strengthens the very things that Maine people rely on every day to succeed, building on the strong success of the currently enacted budget and the last legislative session to tackle Maine's greatest challenges.

We have governed cautiously and in a fiscally prudent way over the past four years, ensuring that – even in the hardest of times during the pandemic – we lived within our means. This budget proposal continues that practice.

We look forward to the discussions over the next several months as we outline each initiative and impact of the proposed investments.

I am pleased to present information to both committees the Governor's biennial budget request for the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation's Bureau of Insurance, Bureau of Financial Institutions, Bureau of Consumer Credit Protection, Office of Securities, Board of Licensure in Medicine, Board of Nursing, Board of Optometry, Board of Dental Practice and Board of Osteopathic Licensure.

As a whole, the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation is charged with the role of protecting the health, safety and welfare of citizens of Maine through the regulation of State-chartered financial institutions, the insurance industry, grantors of consumer credit, the securities industry, and numerous professions and occupations providing services to the public through licensing, examining, and auditing activities; by conducting programs aimed at increasing voluntary compliance with State laws; by investigating possible violations of law; and by undertaking enforcement actions. By encouraging the development of sound ethical businesses which serve the needs of Maine citizens, the Department fosters a healthy business environment through competent, impartial, and efficient regulation.

Bureau of Consumer Credit Protection - 0091

I will start this morning with the Bureau of Consumer Credit Protection on page A-559. This Bureau encourages healthy competition among creditors while protecting Maine citizens from unfair and deceptive financial practices. The agency administers the Maine Consumer Credit Code (Title 9-A), the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act, and other consumer financial protection laws. The Bureau also administers the state's Foreclosure Prevention program, and, most recently, has assumed the role of Student Loan Ombudsman at the Legislature's direction. The Bureau is funded with Other Special Revenue Funds, primarily from licensing and volume fees. Funds for foreclosure prevention come primarily from real estate transfer tax on deeds of foreclosure or in lieu of foreclosure.

Acting Superintendent Linda Conti leads the Bureau of Consumer Credit Protection.

The baseline budget request for this program continues funding for the protection of consumers through regulation and oversight of various financial service providers and funding for staff and contracts with housing counselors for the Foreclosure Prevention program.

The program has a single initiative requesting to establish and fund three Consumer Credit Examiner positions to address the continued growth in the number of licensees and registrants regulated. The number of licensees and registrants has almost doubled over the last two years from 12,991 in September 2020 to 21,186 in August 2022. Current staffing is not sufficient to effectively and efficiently regulate those entities. Three additional examiners will allow for thorough and expeditious processing of new applications, renewals, and other filings during the year. The estimated cost of the positions, including Personal Services and All Other, is \$255,530 in FY24 and \$264,140 in FY25.

BUREAU OF CONSUMER CREDIT PROTECTION 0091

What the Budget purchases:

The agency was established to protect the citizens of Maine from unfair and deceptive practices with respect to mortgage lending, consumer credit and debt collection. The agency implements the Maine Consumer Credit Code, administers laws relating to mortgage lenders, collection agencies, loan brokers, credit reporting agencies, money order issuers, debt settlement companies and other consumer finance businesses. During fiscal year 2019-20, a total of 11,782 companies and individuals held a license or registration. During that same period, the agency's Complaint Division responded to 698 complaints, resulting in \$57,602 in consumer recoveries. The Bureau has a foreclosure prevention and education program which received 258 calls on the toll-free foreclosure hotline and mailed informational packages to 18,763 homeowners in default on their home loans.

Board of Dental Practice - 0384

The Board of Dental Practice, on page A-560, is the first of five affiliated boards I will present today. The term "affiliated" indicates that a licensing board has limited statutory connection to the Department. Each board has its own staff and develops its budget under the general oversight of the Department.

The Board of Dental Practice protects the health and safety of Maine citizens through the regulation of components of dental practice. The Board is supported solely by Other Special Revenue Funds generated from licensing fees. The Board has nine members appointed by the Governor and employs an executive director and administrative staff.

The Board elects a Chair from its members. Dr. Mark D. Zajkowski, DDS, MD is the current Board Chair.

The baseline budget request for this program continues funding for administrative operations such as staff, complaint investigation, board member travel and compensation, and funding to participate in the Medical Professionals Health Program.

The program has a single initiative—to transfer staff positions and allocation from the Board of Dental Practice to DPFR's Office of Professional and Occupation Regulation. This initiative reflects a proposed change in the status of the Board of Dental Practice from a program *affiliated* with the Department to a component program of the Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation. The Department can better support board functions through this status change without impacting the Board's statutory authority or processes. The proposed restructuring will put the Board in an improved financial and staff resource position, enabling the Board and OPOR to realize efficiencies through shared resources. Decreases to position count and allocation to the Board will be offset by corresponding increases in positions and allocation in the OPOR budget. {The OPOR budget request (pages A-567 through A-568) was presented at the public hearing on February 15th, held in conjunction with the Joint Standing Committees on Innovation, Development, Economic Advancement and Business. A copy of the corresponding OPOR budget initiative is attached for your reference.}

This initiative has associated language, part NNN on pages 48-51. The language proposes an amendment to Title 10, which changes the status of the Board of Dental Practice in statute from an affiliated licensing board to a licensure program within the Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation. It also amends and repeals provisions of Title 32, Chapter 143 "Dental Professions" to align statutory terms as part of the organizational restructuring.

DENTAL PRACTICE - BOARD OF 0384

What the Budget purchases:

The Board of Dental Practice was originally established in 1891 to regulate the practice of dentistry. The board licenses qualified dentists, dental hygienists, dental radiographers, expanded function dental assistants and denturists. The board issues permits to qualified licensees to administer general anesthesia and moderate sedation as well as local anesthesia and nitrous oxide permits. The board investigates all complaints alleging violations/noncompliance of related rules and statutes, and imposes discipline when warranted.

- 6. All records, property and equipment previously belonging to or allocated for the use of the Maine Board of Dental Practice as an affiliated board become, on the effective date of this Act, the property of the Maine Board of Dental Practice as a licensure program within the Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation.
- 7. All forms, licenses, letterheads and similar items bearing the name of the Maine Board of Dental Practice as an affiliated board may be used until existing supplies of those items are exhausted.

PART NNN SUMMARY

This Part amends provisions of Title 10, Chapter 901 "Department of Professional and Financial Regulation" by moving the Board of Dental Professions identified in statute as an affiliated board into a licensure program within the Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation. This bill also amends several provisions of Title 32, Chapter 143 "Dental Professions" to make consistent statutory terms as part of the organizational restructuring.

What the Budget purchases:

The Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation is an umbrella administrative agency that regulates professions and occupations through licensure, enforcement of practice laws and professional standards and inspections of facilities and equipment. An administrative complaint process provides a mechanism for resolution of consumer complaints.

The next program on page A-562, Bureau of Financial Institutions, supervises state-chartered financial institutions including banks, credit unions, and nondepository trust companies. The Bureau maintains and promotes safe and sound financial practices; strength, stability, and efficiency of financial institutions; security of deposit and share funds; reasonable and orderly competition; and development and expansion of financial services advantageous to the public welfare. The Bureau is divided into two functional units: Examination; and Research and Administration. The program is funded with Other Special Revenue Funds, primarily from assessments and examinations.

The Bureau of Financial Institutions is led by Superintendent Lloyd LaFountain III.

The baseline budget request for this program provides funding for continued regulation and oversight of financial institutions. The program has no new initiatives.

FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS - BUREAU OF 0093

What the Budget purchases:

The Bureau of Financial Institutions supervises all financial institutions chartered by the State. The bureau examines institutions for safety and soundness and compliance with state laws and engages in enforcement actions such as issuance of regulatory orders to assure the strength and stability of the regulated industry. In its supervisory role, the bureau also promulgates regulations and acts on applications for new charters, branches, mergers and closely related activities. The bureau is also a resource for consumers of banking services and provides mediation services and advice to consumers who have questions or complaints involving a financial institution.

Bureau of Insurance - 0092

Next, on page A-563, the Bureau of Insurance is responsible for the regulation and oversight of the insurance industry in Maine. The primary responsibility of the Bureau is to regulate insurance companies and insurance professionals in the public interest. Duties and responsibilities include the examination of domestic insurers and limited oversight of foreign and alien insurers, the approval of all policies and contract forms used by insurers in the State, and the authorization of individual and group workers' compensation self-insurers. The Bureau ensures that all licensed companies are financially solvent and that all licensed entities and individuals comply with Maine law. The program is funded with Other Special Revenue Funds, primarily from licensing fees.

The Bureau of Insurance is led by Acting Superintendent Timothy Schott.

The baseline budget request for the Bureau of Insurance provides funding for the continued regulation and oversight of the insurance industry through licensing, registration, examination, complaint investigation, outreach, and education.

The program has no new initiatives.

INSURANCE - BUREAU OF 0092

What the Budget purchases:

The Bureau of Insurance, in a coordinated effort with other states, through the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC), regulates the business of insurance and provides consumer assistance in the State of Maine. Regulatory responsibilities include financial solvency regulation and consumer protection. These responsibilities are met through the enforcement of Maine law in regard to policy form and rate filing review, financial analysis and examination, consumer complaint resolution, market conduct examination and licensing of various insurance entities. licensing of various insurance entities.

Board of Licensure in Medicine - 0376

The next program on pages A-564 and A-565, the Board of Licensure in Medicine is an affiliated licensing board, which as I mentioned earlier, has a limited statutory connection to the Department.

The Board safeguards the lives and health of Maine citizens by licensing qualified applicants and regulating the medical practice of those licensees. The Board is supported solely by Other Special Revenue Funds generated from licensing fees. The Board consists of 11 members appointed by the Governor and employs an executive director and administrative staff.

Dr. Maroulla S. Gleaton, M.D. is the current Board Chair.

The baseline budget request for this program continues funding for administrative operations such as staff, complaint investigation, board member travel and compensation, and contracting for professional services, including hearing officer and the Medical Professional Health Program.

The program has seven initiatives.

The 1st initiative increases funding for services provided by the Office of the Attorney General by \$31,955 in FY2024 and \$44,843 in FY2025. The cost of legal services is based on estimates provided by the AG's Office.

The 2nd initiative increases allocation by \$70,708 annually for professional services supporting the Maine Professionals Health Program, whose mission includes helping and monitoring licensees with substance use problems and contracting with evaluators and expert reviewers. As the number and complexity of reviews increase, the Board relies on MPHP for professional services related to hearings which have also increased in complexity and cost.

The 3rd initiative increases allocation for out-of-state travel by \$10,101 annually. Increased travel is required as the Board of Licensure in Medicine participates in more interstate compacts and meetings involving interstate cooperation.

The 4th initiative reflects a net increase in funding for services provided by MaineIT by \$20,997 in FY2024 and \$21,041 in FY25. The estimated cost of services provided by MaineIT is based on current usage and FY24/25 MaineIT rates.

The last initiative on page A-564 increases funding for the Physician III position by \$57,538 in FY24 and \$60,055 in FY25 to fund a full-time position. Currently, the position is at 60 hours bi-weekly. With a full-time position, the Board expects to be better able to attract and retain candidates to better serve the public. This position is heavily involved with the reviews and investigations of licensees which are increasing in number and complexity.

Moving to page A-565, the next initiative establishes and provides funding for one Office Specialist II position to assist with compact licensing, the monitoring of disciplined physicians, and helping to address patient safety issues in a timely manner. The estimated cost of the position including Personal Services and All Other is \$81,551 in FY24 and \$86,426 in FY25.

The final initiative for this program increases allocation by \$31,678 in FY24 and \$31,125 in FY25 to fund the Bureau of Human Resources (BHR) approved reclassification of the Assistant Executive Director position.

LICENSURE IN MEDICINE - BOARD OF 0376

What the Budget purchases:

The Board of Licensure in Medicine was established in 1896 to protect Maine citizens by regulating physicians who practice medicine. The board protects citizens by: 1) licensing physicians by determining qualifications, examining and certifying candidates; 2) approving training programs and renewing registration biennially for Physicians Assistants; 3) conducting education and outreach programs for licensees and the public; and 4) investigating allegations of incompetence, unprofessional conduct and noncompliance with the laws rules and standards relating to the practice of medicine, holding public hearings and educating, retraining and disciplining physicians and physician assistants as appropriate.

Next on page A-566 is the budget request for the Maine State Board of Nursing, another affiliated program. The Board protects the public through the regulation of nursing practice. The Board is supported solely by Other Special Revenue Funds generated from licensing fees. The Board consists of nine members appointed by the Governor and employs an executive director and administrative staff.

Valerie J. Fuller, D.N.P., is the current Board Chair.

The baseline budget request for this program continues funding for administrative operations such as staff, complaint investigation, board member travel and compensation, and contracting with the Medical Professional Health Program.

The 1st initiative increases allocation by \$38,586 in FY24 and \$15,365 in FY25 to fund the Bureau of Human Resources approved reclassification of two Office Associate II positions to two Office Specialist I positions and the reclassification of one Office Specialist I position to an Office Specialist II position. The reclassifications have an effective date of May 21, 2020, so the increase in FY24 includes the estimated cost of retroactive payments and interest due to incumbents.

The 2nd initiative increases funding for services provided by the Office of the Attorney General by \$13,500 in FY2024 and \$21,720 in FY2025. The cost for legal services is based on estimates provided by the AG's Office.

The 3rd initiative, not included in your material, but to be included with the Governor's change package, increases allocation by \$86,366 in FY24 and \$20,089 in FY25 for the BHR-approved reclassification of the existing Assistant Executive Director position. This reclassification is effective June 5, 2020, and the FY24 increase includes the estimated retroactive payments and interest due to the current and previous incumbents.

NURSING - BOARD OF 0372

What the Budget purchases:

The Board of Nursing regulates nursing practice through licensure by exam or endorsement; the renewal of qualified applicants; the investigation of complaints of unsafe nursing practice or any violation of law related to nursing practice; and the adoption of rules and regulations governing licensure of nurses and other matters within its jurisdiction.

Office of Securities - 00943

The next program I will present is the Office of Securities on pages A-569 and A-570. The Office protects Maine investors through the administration and enforcement of the Maine Uniform Securities Act. The Office reviews applications to register securities for sale in Maine and filings for exemptions from registration; licenses broker-dealers, agents, investment advisers, and investment adviser representatives doing business in Maine; conducts on-site examinations of the operations of licensees; administers an investor education program; response to consumer complaints; investigates; and, when warranted by the circumstances, issues cease and desist and other administrative orders. The Office enforces the State Commodity Code and the Regulations of the Sale of Business Opportunities. The Office also manages the newly created Securities Restitution Assistance Fund program. The program is funded with Other Special Revenue Fund from license renewal fees and has a small Federal Expenditures Fund allocation.

The Office is led by Acting Securities Administrator Edward Moran.

The baseline budget request for this program provides funding to continue to protect Maine citizens against fraud and other abusive practices in connection with the sale of securities, through licensing, registration, and investigation as well as outreach and education.

This program has four initiatives. However, we are withdrawing the 1st initiative for increased funding for AG services.

The 2nd initiative establishes and provides funding for one Principal Securities Specialist position to manage investor education and outreach for the Office. The position will act as an investor education outreach specialist, focusing on financial literacy outreach and providing education to industry and individuals on concerns relating to elder financial exploitation. While investigation and enforcement are necessary components of the Office's mission, prevention is important to protect investors. Investor outreach raises the level of awareness of investors, aiding them in making informed decisions, giving them better understanding of and ability to manage risk and reduce their vulnerability to fraudulent schemes. The estimated cost of the position including Personal Services and All Other is \$111,210 in FY24 and \$116,280 in FY25.

The 3rd initiative increases allocation by \$2,547 in FY24 and \$2,668 inf FY25 to increase the hours of one Principal Securities Specialist position from 78 hours bi-weekly to 80. The Office will be better able to attract and retain candidates with a full-time position.

The final initiative increases allocation by \$150,194 in FY25 and \$74,923 in FY25 to procure and implement a case management software application. The Office will seek an application for case workflow tracking of administrative and criminal cases, allowing for efficiencies in assignment, opening, and closing cases; and increasing the ability to maintain and report on key data. Higher allocation in FY24 is estimated to cover purchase and implementation as well as ongoing licensing and maintenance costs.

OFFICE OF SECURITIES 0943

What the Budget purchases:

The Office of Securities administers and enforces the Maine Uniform Securities Act, the Maine Commodities Code and the Business Opportunity Act. The office reviews applications to register securities for sale in Maine; reviews filings for exemptions from registration; and licenses broker-dealers, sales representatives and investment advisors doing business in Maine. The office suspends or revokes such licenses and imposes fines for misconduct. The office responds to consumer complaints and investigates possible violations of the securities laws and may take administrative action or refer matters to the Attorney General for civil or criminal action. Through these actions the office may obtain restitution for investors harmed by the actions of licensees. The office may also take action either administratively or through a civil or criminal action which also could result in restitution for investors. The office conducts outreach for licensees and investors. outreach for licensees and investors.

Board of Optometry - 0385

The next program, on page A-570, is the Board of Optometry. The Board protects the public through the regulation of the practice of optometry, including examination and licensing of qualified applicants and investigation of complaints and cases of non-compliance. The board is funded exclusively with Other Special Revenue Funds, primarily licensing fees. The Board consists of six members appointed by the Governor for terms of five years and employs a single administrative employee.

The Board elects a President from its members. Thomas Nadeau, O.D. is the current Board President.

The baseline budget request for this program continues funding for administrative operations such as staff, complaint investigation, board member travel and compensation, printing, and rulemaking.

The Board has two initiatives.

The 1st initiative increases funding for services provided by the Office of the Attorney General by \$1,146 in FY2024 and \$1,618 in FY2025. Cost for legal services is based on estimates provided by the AG's Office.

The final initiative increases allocation for out-of-state travel by \$1,968 annually to allow the Board to attend the Association of Regulatory Boards of Optometry (ARBO) annual meetings, a professional association.

OPTOMETRY - BOARD OF 0385

What the Budget purchases:

The Board of Optometry regulates the practice of optometry. The board examines and licenses qualified applicants to practice optometric medicine. The board investigates allegations of noncompliance with the laws and rules relating to the practice of optometry, conducts hearings and imposes disciplinary actions.

The Board elects a Chair from its members. Melissa Michaud, PA-C, is the current Board Chair.

The baseline budget request for this program continues funding for administrative operations such as staff, complaint investigation, board member travel and compensation, and contracting with the Maine Medical Professionals Health Program.

The program has a single initiative increasing funding for services provided by the Office of the Attorney General by \$28,217 in FY2024 and \$34,321 in FY2025. Cost for legal services is based on estimates provided by the AG's Office.

The Fund was established by PL2021, Chapter 576 to provide financial assistance to victims of securities violations that have been awarded restitution in a final order issued by the Securities Administrator or were awarded restitution in a final order in a legal action initiated by the administrator and that have not received the full amount of restitution ordered before the application for restitution assistance is due.

The baseline budget provides allocation for assistance payments to victims. The administrative duties associated with managing the fund are handled by the Office of Securities.

SECURITIES RESTITUTION ASSISTANCE FUND 2352 What the Budget purchases: The Office of Securities administers and enforces the Maine Uniform Securities Act, the Maine Commodities Code, and the Business Opportunity Act. The office responds to consumer complaints; investigates possible violations of the securities laws and may take administrative action or refer matters to the Attorney General for civil or criminal action. Through these actions the Office may obtain restitution for investors harmed by the actions of licensees. The Securities Restitution Assistance Fund was established to provide financial assistance to victims of securities violations that have been awarded restitution in a final order issued by the Securities Administrator or were awarded restitution in a final order in a legal action initiated by the administrator and that have not received the full amount of restitution ordered before the application for restitution assistance is due.
