As a DSP, I take care of individuals with intellectual disabilities, I advocate for the people I support, and I assist them with their daily needs.

I chose this career because I am passionate about helping people. People with disabilities are special, and they deserve to be happy, so putting smiles on their faces is what gives me joy.

Though the wages and benefits might not be motivating, this does not change my passion about providing quality care for the people I support. However, due to the low wages and benefits received by DSPs, it has resulted in them engaging in more than one job and high turnover rates.

The cost-of-living adjustments are critical to attracting and retaining direct care and support professionals – failing to invest in this workforce risks significant health and economic impacts.
