The Coalition seeks to work in partnership with state and federal elected officials to meet the needs of Maine people.

Our cities are committed to providing the best education possible to each and every one of our students. One of the most important obligations we have as public officials is to prepare them for the future. We appreciate the Legislature's commitment to a strong education system and to fully funding the state's 55 percent share of K-12 costs.

We respectfully ask you to extend Maine's commitment by also covering 55 percent of the special education costs under the essential program and services school funding formula as proposed in LD 71.

You're well aware that costs for these programs have risen dramatically. Municipalities providing special education in their school systems struggle to find qualified special education staff and then must pay increased costs for salaries, health care and other benefits. Municipalities providing special education through private schools are seeing transportation shortages and higher tuition fees compounded by the recently imposed directive that payments are required for an entire year as opposed to only the days students attend.

Increasing the state share of special education funding would help cities and towns across Maine continue to meet our obligation to deliver a quality education to all students and to bring property tax relief to homeowners and businesses. Please give every consideration to supporting LD 71.
