Senator Hickman, Representative Supica and members of the Veterans and Legal Affairs Committee, my name is Lizzy Hayes, I am medical cannabis caregiver, an organic farmer, and I am before you today to testify in support of LD 584

In the state of Maine, the heads of Departments, Commissions and Boards are appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the Legislature. Legislative oversight is a fundamental check and balance. The head of the Office of Cannabis Policy should also be subject to the process of legislative review and approval especially as this is an emerging industry that uniquely operates outside of federal law.

The director of the office of cannabis policy oversees an agricultural industry that has sold over \$500 million of product last year, over \$243 million for Adult Use (\$243,876,905) and over \$273 million for Medical (\$273,759,909) which brought in over \$53 million (\$53,749,741) in sales and excise tax.

Choices made by cannabis regulators shape the landscape of the industry, determine the ability or inability for small operators to participate, affect the price to the consumer, and determine whether policy matches public expectations. Regulators must weigh the costs and benefits of regulatory burdens and decide if policy choices are an efficient means to achieve desired outcomes and the legislative intent.

A confirmation hearing provides an opportunity to assert public expectations. Concerns can be raised about potential conflict of interest, relevant industry or regulatory experience and potentially conflicting policy agendas. It is an opportunity for the appointee to understand the will of the people of Maine and the will of the legislature before beginning their role as director of a valuable state industry that touches many different sectors of our economy and society.

I'd like to take this opportunity to point out that the initial 2019 METRC contract included a line item of \$21,762 a year for software updates, or 100 hours at a rate of \$217.62/hr. At the time director Gunderson noted the importance of picking a track and trace system that allowed for customization if necessary. The software build out negotiated in 2023 by our current director cost the state \$350,000. At that hourly rate outlined in 2019, a \$350,000 software buildout would come to 1608 hours of labor, or 40 hours a week for 42 weeks in order to allow a cultivator to input a group of plants as a batch instead of each plant individually. Concerns about the ability of our director to be a good negotiator for the state of Maine with state funds with this particular company would have been brought to light if the language put forward in this bill were already in place.

I thank you for your time and attention and ask that you vote ought to pass on LD584

plants in production, total plants destroyed, and total inventory adjustments. The Metre system should provide additional tools for administration and enforcement, including fraud and abuse prevention.

- Interface portal to provide access to all potential external users (i.e., growers, provisioning centers, secure transports, safety compliance facilities, processors).
- All required third-party software for State use (the State reserves the right to utilize existing licenses where applicable).
