RE: LD 1323, An Act to Prohibit the Use of Neonicotinoid Pesticides and the Use and Sale of Neonicotinoid-treated Seeds

Dear Sen. Talbot Ross, Rep. Pluecker, and Members of the ACF Committee:

My name is Ania Wright, and I am Maine Audubon's Policy Advocate. Maine Audubon is a wildlife conservation non-profit – we fulfill our mission to "conserve Maine wildlife and wildlife habitat" by engaging people of all ages in nature through a science-based approach to education, conservation, and advocacy. On behalf of Maine Audubon and our 30,000 members, supporters, and volunteers, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of LD 1323, *An Act to Prohibit the Use of Neonicotinoid Pesticides and the Use and Sale of Neonicotinoid-treated Seeds*.

We urge you to support LD 1323, a critical step in safeguarding Maine's ecosystems, wildlife, and public health from the pervasive and well-documented harms of neonicotinoid insecticides, also called "neonics." Though effective at managing pests, neonics pose threats to Maine wildlife, pollinators, and farmers due to their indiscriminate nature and pervasiveness in the environment. In 2021, The 130th Legislature banned the use of some of the most prevalent neonics (dinotefuran, clothianidin, imidacloprid, and thiamethoxam) in most residential uses with the passage of LD 155. LD 1323 updates the current law to prohibit the application of *all* neonics to ornamental plants, plants during bloom, and certain cereal crops, as well as prohibiting the use of neonic-coated soybean and cereal crop seeds.

In addition to Maine Audubon's written testimony, please see the separately submitted testimony from 22 environmental, public health, and social justice organizations in support of LD 1323, and a petition signed by nearly 850 Maine Audubon members and supporters.

Neonics are a class of synthetic pesticides that are widely used to eliminate pests in agriculture, horticulture, and in some pet flea and tick treatments. They are the most prevalently used class of insecticides in the United States, and are popular due to their relatively low cost and high effectiveness of dealing with historically difficult pests. Unlike other pesticides, neonics are systemic, meaning that they are taken up by plants from the soil and become present in plant material and pollen. Despite their effectiveness, neonic threats outweigh their benefits. Over 90% of neonics applied as treatments leach into soil, air, and water, contaminating non-target plants, wildflowers, and ecosystems. The planting process itself emits neonic dust clouds that drift into neighboring lands and waterways, putting native flora and fauna at risk.

Neonic effectiveness is indiscriminate and kills not only pest insects, but beneficial pollinators, other insects, and wildlife that eat affected plants and insects. Perhaps most widely known, neonic use is attributed to mass pollinator declines which threaten our food system and farmers. On the subsequent pages, please see in depth descriptions of effects that neonics have been found to have on various pollinators, amphibians, birds, endangered species, and even mammals.

Furthermore, these pesticides are not necessary nor economically viable in all of the wide array of applications that neonics are currently being used. Peer-reviewed research demonstrates that neonicotinoid seed treatments for corn, soybean, and other cereal crops offer little to no economic advantage for farmers. According to a 2020 Cornell University review of over 250 field trials, 89% of corn studies and 82-89% of soybean studies showed no yield increase from using neonics. Even compared to no insecticide use at all, the vast majority of trials found no benefit. Farmers frequently do not know their seeds are treated, and untreated seeds are often not commercially available or have to be specifically sought out. Another study from Penn State University showed that using neonic-coated soybean seeds actually decreased yield because they reduced beneficial predators. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) itself concluded that neonic-treated soybean seeds offer "no overall net income benefit." In most cases, these pesticides are used as preventative measures, not as responses to specific pest problems.

Other jurisdictions have restricted or prohibited the use of neonics and treated seeds, but their farms continue to thrive. Similar laws to LD 1323 have been passed in New York (in 2023)⁵ and Vermont (in 2024).⁶ Globally, the European Commission,⁷ Quebec,⁸ and Ontario⁹ have created restrictions on neonic coated seeds and use.

WILDLIFE & ECOSYSTEM IMPACTS

Aquatic Ecosystems

Neonicotinoids are water-soluble and easily enter aquatic ecosystems through runoff, posing threats to aquatic ecosystems, invertebrates, and amphibians. Once introduced into water systems, neonics persist and can bioaccumulate. Exposure to neonics can be lethal to invertebrate species, and can lead to sublethal effects including reduced feeding and reproduction, reduced growth, and immobility. Over time, these impacts can harm entire populations and alter food webs, as well as multiplying existing threats due to an already weakened population.

Amphibians, which are particularly vulnerable to environmental toxins due to their permeable skin and cutaneous respiration, are also vulnerable to neonic toxicity. Studies have shown that neonic exposure in amphibians can lead to abnormal behaviors, disruption of developmental processes, increased predation, neurological issues, and heightened mortality. One recent study showed a 10% decrease in larval survival to metamorphosis when tadpoles were exposed to imidacloprid. 15.7% of individuals developed undifferentiated or hermaphroditic gonads—indicating endocrine disruption.

Endangered Species Risk

According to a recent EPA review, three commonly used neonics—including imidacloprid—pose a threat to 75% of all endangered plants and animals. Imidacloprid alone has been found to adversely impact 1,445 species, including over 80% of federally endangered species. ¹⁴ The study showed species such as the Northern Long-Eared Bat and Piping Plover, both listed in Maine, are at particularly high risk.

Impacts on Human and Mammal Health

Neonics have long been considered to have low toxicity to mammals and humans, especially in comparison to older insecticides such as organophosphates and carbamates. However, evidence increasingly demonstrates that neonics do pose risks to mammalian and human health due to their persistence in the environment. Humans are continuously exposed to neonics through drinking water, the food that we eat, or indoor air contamination following pest treatments.

Neonics can persist in the environment for up to 19 years, making long term exposure a high risk, and epidemiological studies have confirmed that quantities of neonics have gradually increased over the last decade in human samples. Exposure to these pesticides have been associated with headache, fatigue, convulsions, abdominal and chest pain, weakness, tremors, respiratory failure, and memory loss. A study in Minnesota found that imidacloprid was found at higher concentrations in the spleens of white-tailed deer, leading to lethargy, smaller organ sizes, and potentially lower reproductive success. These effects pose risks to Maine's deer population and, by extension, its ecological and economic health.

Rirds

Even a single treated corn kernel can kill a bird the size of a Blue Jay. 17,18 Birds are primarily exposed to neonicotinoids through eating treated insects, seeds, or plants. Exposure to even low levels

of neonicotinoids can impair avian directional ability, impacting migration, and breeding. Neonics negatively impact bird reproduction, contributing to reduced chick survival, eggshell thinning, and low hatch and fertility rates.¹⁹ Widespread contamination has been linked to population declines in grassland and insectivorous species like songbirds, sparrows, and flycatchers. Furthermore, non-target insect declines from neonicotinoids can negatively impact bird populations that rely on them for sustenance, even if the birds themselves are not exposed.²⁰

Cornell's Wildlife Health Lab warns that birds ingesting neonic-coated seeds face acute toxicity, while chronic exposure reduces reproductive success and impairs navigation and foraging. The American Bird Conservancy has documented widespread contamination in bird habitats, threatening both migratory and resident species.

Pollinators:

Pollinators—vital to both Maine's ecosystems and agricultural economy—are in crisis, and neonics are a primary driver. Neonics are 7,000 times more toxic to bees than DDT, banned in 1972.²¹ Just one teaspoon of imidacloprid can kill 1.25 billion honeybees.²² 5.1 ppb of clothianidin, 6.4 ppb of imidacloprid, or 5.1 ppb of thiamethoxam is sufficient to compromise honey bee reproductive function,²³ reduce egg-laying by 50%,²⁴ and cause queen death.²⁵ Pollinators contribute tens of billions of dollars annually to U.S. agriculture, including key Maine crops like blueberries, apples, squash, and tomatoes.²⁶ Their decline not only threatens biodiversity but also food security and rural economies.

INVASIVE SPECIES MANAGEMENT

Despite their incredible harms, there may be situations in which it is necessary to apply neonicotinoids in a controlled environment or ecological emergency. Invasive species that have become prevalent in

Maine, such as Hemlock Woolly Adelgid or the Emerald Ash Borer, can be effectively managed using neonicotinoid treatment. The risks of applying neonics to affected species can and must be weighed with the cost of not addressing the invasive species or using alternative treatments, and should be applied using practices to minimize environmental and ecological harm. LD 1323 effectively outlines methodologies to reach this goal through an extensive exemption process.

LD 1323 is a science-backed, economically reasonable, and ecologically necessary policy that reflects growing awareness of the dangers posed by neonicotinoids. Maine has an opportunity to be a leader in safeguarding biodiversity, pollinator health, and sustainable agriculture.

We respectfully urge this committee to vote "Ought to Pass" on LD 1323. Thank you for your time and your commitment to protecting Maine's natural resources.

On behalf of the environmental, conservation, and public health organizations listed below, please pass LD 1323, An Act to Prohibit the Use of Neonicotinoid Pesticides and the Use and Sale of Neonicotinoid-treated Seeds, to protect Maine farmers, pollinators, and our environment. As harmful neonicotinoids ('neonics') continue to be used in Maine, it is more important than ever to protect Maine farmers, pollinators, and our food system by prohibiting the use of neonic treated seeds and expanding the current list of prohibited uses of neonics.

Neonics are a class of synthetic pesticides that are used widely due to their effectiveness as a neurotoxin to eliminate pests. They are commonly used on farmlands, lawns, gardens, and in flea and tick pet treatments. Unlike other pesticides, neonics are systemic, meaning that they are taken up by plants from the soil and become present in plant material and pollen. Neonics can also enter groundwater and can remain in the soil for many years. Neonic effectiveness is indiscriminate and they kill not only pest insects, but beneficial pollinators, other insects, and wildlife that eat affected plants or insects. Neonicanatoid use is attributed to mass pollinator declines which threaten our food system and farmers.

Given evidence of worsening effects of widespread neonic use, encouraging evidence of farmers transitioning to non-neonic pesticides, and a growing movement toward non-neonic use regionally and worldwide, **now is the time to expand Maine's current restrictions on neonicotinoid use**. LD 1323 updates the current law to prohibit the application of *all* neonics to ornamental plants, plants during bloom, and certain cereal crops, as well as prohibiting the use of neonic coated soybean and cereal crop seeds.

Here in Maine, we take pride in our pristine environment and abundant wildlife. We support family farms, and trust that decision makers will protect their livelihood, along with the land we love and the pollinators that are vital to our survival and the wildlife that depends on them. Please support LD 1323.

As someone who cares deeply about Maine's environment, native wildlife, and the health of our farms and food system, I urge you to support LD 1323, which would expand restrictions on the use of harmful neonicotinoid pesticides ("neonics").

Neonics are a class of systemic pesticides that are toxic to bees, butterflies, birds, and other beneficial insects, contaminate water, and persist in soil for months or years. These chemicals are absorbed by plants and remain present in pollen and nectar, making them especially dangerous to pollinators critical to agriculture and natural ecosystems.

Despite the passage of LD 155 in 2021, which limited certain non-essential uses of neonics, these pesticides continue to threaten Maine's environment. Some companies coat seeds with neonics before planting, but over 90% of these chemicals end up in surrounding soil and water, providing little to no benefit to farmers while devastating pollinator populations and disrupting the ecological balance.

LD 1323 is a necessary next step. It would:

- Prohibit the use of neonics on ornamental plants, blooming crops, and certain food crops;
- Ban the use of neonic-coated soybean and cereal crop seeds, and;
- Maintain emergency exemptions for agricultural and environmental crises.

This legislation aligns Maine with similar laws in New York, Vermont, Quebec, and the European Union, and supports farmers by promoting safer, more sustainable growing practices.

By signing this petition, I stand with the people of Maine in calling for bold action to protect our native bees, our food system, and our shared environment. Please support LD 1323.
