RE: Support of LD 1770 – An Act to Provide Immediate and Long-term Property Tax Relief to Maine Households

Good afternoon, Senator Grohoski, Representative Cloutier, and members of the Committee on Taxation. I'm Shelley Megquier, Policy & Research Director at Maine Farmland Trust. I'm before you today as the Vice President of the Agricultural Council of Maine ("AgCOM"), a nonprofit association that brings together the major sectors of Maine's agricultural economy. I'm glad to be able to share AgCOM's support of LD 1770.

AgCOM supports Maine agriculture by providing a forum for communication among agricultural groups and providing leadership and advocacy on issues that affect all sectors of Maine agriculture.

Our members discussed this bill at our last meeting. We were interested in the formation of the task force as a tool to dive into the topic of property tax relief for Maine households and come up with solutions that will make a measurable long-term impact in the lives of Maine residents. However, we do believe that such an effort should include members of the agricultural sector, given the vast tracks of open land that agricultural producers manage in our state and the importance of considering land use as part of property tax relief.

Farms are a vital part of Maine's economy. Maine's farms sustain each one of us, every day, with the nourishing food that they produce and the contributions they make to our communities. Unfortunately, Maine farmers face a hard reality: many of them are simply not profitable in today's economy. Inflation,¹ interest rates,² and labor costs are all driving up the cost of doing business, yet, in most sectors, prices paid to farmers remain flat. In the five-year period between 2017 and 2022, Maine lost more than 82,000 acres of farmland,³ our State's iconic dairy industry has lost one-third of its farms since 2020,

while field prices for Maine's wild blueberry producers have declined by more than 45% over the last 20 years.⁴

In discussions with farmers about the costs of business and paths to profitability, the subject of property taxes is often raised as an important part of a solution. Although programs do exist to help control property taxes applied to Maine farms, farmers report that challenges remain. Municipalities are not all equally aware of existing programs and many farmers report facing challenges when trying to get their land assessed for current use or share that the relief through that program is not enough. Further, existing agricultural valuation rates may not sufficiently reflect the true value of our farms to the State of Maine.

On behalf of AGCOM, we ask for your support of LD 1770 and that you consider adding agricultural membership to the task force, so that these issues can be given their due consideration and provide solutions for Maine's farming community.
