

**Testimony of John Raymond, Public Relations Representative for ATV Maine**

**Testimony In Support Of**

**LD 1762, An Act to Protect Recreational Trails by Establishing the Trails for the Future Program**

Honorable Members of the Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry Committee,

My name is John Raymond, and I am the Past President and current Public Relations Representative for ATV Maine, the statewide organization representing over 60 ATV clubs and thousands of riders across Maine. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of LD 1762, "An Act to Protect Recreational Trails by Establishing the Trails for the Future Program," which aims to protect public access to recreational trails.

Recreational trails are a cornerstone of Maine's outdoor recreation economy, drawing visitors from near and far to explore our state's natural beauty. These trails fuel local businesses—hotels, restaurants, and outfitters—in rural areas, creating jobs and fostering community vitality. From the rolling hills of York County to the forests of Franklin County and on to the farmlands of Aroostook, ATV trails connect people to Maine's landscapes, generating economic activity that strengthens our state. The bill's requirement that trails maintain their existing uses—including ATV access—safeguards the integrity of our trail network.

The economic benefits of ATV trails extend beyond tourism, supporting Maine's rural way of life. By investing in trail protection through the Trails for the Future Fund, LD 1762 will enhance the accessibility and quality of our trails, attracting more riders and amplifying their economic impact. This bill is a proactive step to preserve the trails that drive prosperity in our communities, ensuring that future generations of Mainers and visitors can experience the joy of ATV riding.

We commend Representative Blier and the bill's co-sponsors for their leadership in championing Maine's recreational heritage. We urge the Committee to pass LD 1762 and stand ready to answer questions or provide further insights. Thank you for your commitment to Maine's trails and economy.
