Re: LD 1556 - Resolve, Regarding Increasing the Number of Kennebec County Commissioners LD 1884 - Resolve, to Increase the Number of Kennebec County Commissioners

Senator Joe Baldacci, Representative Suzanne Salisbury, and honorable members of the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government.

I would respectfully encourage this committee to vote <u>ought not to pass</u> for both LD 1556 and LD 1884 for the following reasons:

- > Either legislative bill was not discussed collectively, nor agreed to by the Kennebec County Commission.
- > No discussion was had regarding the need or benefit of such a decision to the taxpayers of Kennebec County.
 - o No consideration of cost was determined or assessed: referendum; district apportion; advertising/administrative costs; increased salary/benefits; memberships/training/equipment/reimbursements; other associated costs with these legislative bills.
 - o County meeting rooms will have to be remodeled to accommodate five commissioners.
 - o The Budget Committee will now grow from 9 to 15; this is unmanageable and require two more budget caucuses.
 - o Administration is difficult enough with the current social and cost issues facing county government.

It would appear that the root cause of these bills is the statutory requirement regarding a quorum found in Title 30-A §72. Quorum A majority of the commissioners constitutes a quorum. This language does not allow commissioners, of a commission of three, to talk outside of a public meeting. This apparently has recently only become a problem (however hasn't been in the 200 year plus prior history of Kennebec County), but for some reason it is now. I have grave concerns with discussions between commissioners outside of a public meeting which could lead to the potential of prior "agreements" without a public discussion of the issue; the addition of two more commissioners would facilitate that environment.

As administrator of Kennebec County, I have serious concerns with any potential, unfunded (as there is no fiscal note) cost increases to Kennebec County and its property taxpayers. The County is already struggling with State and Department of Corrections correctional mandates/ standards causing significant increases to property taxpayers. County government deals directly the complexity of its citizens, cost control and social issues (opioid, substance use disorder, domestic/ sexual abuse, to name a few). County government needs to be decisive and sensitive to the needs of the community and not be bogged down by bureaucracy, ineffectiveness and more cost. I do not believe either bill is acting in the best interest of the county or its residents.

Thank you for your consideration of this testimony and my request of this committee; ought not to pass.
