Good afternoon, Senator Hickman, Representative Supica, and members of the Joint Standing Committee on Veterans and Legal Affairs:

My name is Barry W. Norris, and I am here today on behalf of the **Maine Association of Agricultural Fairs**, representing over 25 agricultural fairs held annually across our state from large, multi-day expositions to small, rural celebrations of Maine's deep agricultural heritage.

I am here to offer our **strong support for LD 1838**, which presents a vital opportunity to deliver **sustainable**, **community-centered revenue** to organizations that are pillars of Maine's cultural and economic fabric: farms, agricultural fairs, Wabanaki tribal governments, veterans' homes and the harness racing industry.

The Economic Importance of Maine's Agricultural Fairs

Agricultural fairs are more than cherished local traditions—they are **economic engines** for rural and urban communities alike:

- Each year, Maine's fairs attract over 800,000 visitors, generating tens of millions of dollars in direct and indirect economic activity.
- According to a 2022 regional analysis, spending related to agricultural fairs in Maine supports **over 1,500 jobs**, ranging from vendors and food producers to entertainers and agricultural educators.
- Fairs provide a **critical marketing and sales platform** for Maine farmers, crafters, and small businesses, often representing their most significant income-generating events of the year.
- Nonprofit agricultural fairs reinvest revenue into community education, 4-H programs, fairground maintenance, youth scholarships, and agricultural outreach, strengthening the local food system and youth involvement in farming.

Why LD 1838 Matters

LD 1838 proposes a model that will **allocate a portion of newly regulated gaming revenues** to support longstanding community institutions and economically vulnerable sectors, without burdening taxpayers.

For agricultural fairs specifically, this bill would offer:

- **Predictable, long-term revenue** that can stabilize operational budgets, support critical infrastructure upgrades, and expand educational programming.
- Resources to maintain and improve **public safety, sanitation, and accessibility**, ensuring fairs can continue serving Maine communities safely and equitably.
- Capacity to expand agricultural programming that connects the public—especially younger generations—to Maine's working landscape and food systems.

We also commend the bill's commitment to **equity and inclusion**, supporting Wabanaki tribes and veterans' homes with a share of the benefits—ensuring that this revenue serves not only economic ends, but social justice and community resilience.

Conclusion

At a time when family farms, rural communities, and local institutions are under increasing financial pressure, LD 1838 provides a creative, fair, and forward-thinking solution. Supporting this bill means investing in the vitality of Maine agriculture, preserving our cultural traditions, and sustaining the fairs that connect generations to the land and to each other.
