

LD 1820 Testimony

Chairpersons, members of the committee,

I am writing to express my support for LD 1820.

First, the bill reclassifies all product transferred to manufacturing as biomass, to be taxed at the trim rate. This correction is long overdue. Taxing biomass inconsistently—especially when it's destined for extraction—has placed an unfair financial burden on operators. Biomass, by definition, includes various plant materials not suitable for direct sale, and it should be taxed accordingly. This change will bring much-needed consistency and fairness to our tax structure.

Second, LD 1820 removes excessive and unnecessary compliance measures related to authorized deliveries. These requirements have significantly increased operating costs and compliance complexity for retailers. Streamlining these rules will help legal businesses operate more efficiently while continuing to ensure accountability and safety.

Finally, the bill upholds constitutional rights by preventing agencies from requiring licensees to sign documents that waive their rights protected under constitutional, statutory, or common law privileges. This is a crucial safeguard. No regulatory regime should come at the expense of basic civil liberties. This provision ensures fairness and legal integrity within the industry.




