Biennial Budget Report Back

The Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry submits the following report related to the proposed 2016-17 Biennial Budget initiatives.

- Out of the 188 votes taken by our Committee, 148 were unanimous.
- Of the 40 votes that were not unanimous, 38 of them received one dissenting vote.
- The unanimously voted initiatives and 38 initiatives with one dissenting vote represent 99% of the proposals that were presented to our Committee.

Attached to this memo is a copy of our completed report back document. A summary of several initiatives that generated increased levels of interest from both Committee members and the public are included below.

- Approximately 26 initiatives (Ref. # 246, 336, 337, 338, 339, 340, 341, 342, 441, 456, 457, 458, 459, 460, 461, 462, 463, 464, 465, 481, 482, 483, 490, 491, 492, 493) and two corresponding Language portions (Part W and Part Y) were identified by the Committee as being directly connected to a Department of ACF reorganization effort that would have separated the current Bureau of Parks and Lands and relocated various programs between the Bureau of Forestry and a newly-created Bureau of Conservation.
 - o Voted OUT by the Committee, 10-1.
- Initiative: Reduces funding as a result of phasing in the elimination of the surcharge assessed on product name pet food in the Animal Welfare Program (Ref. # 281 on P5 and corresponding Language Part X).
 - o Voted OUT by the Committee, 11-1.
 - o The one dissenting vote indicated that he wanted to leave the initiative IN but reduce the surcharge to \$15 in 2015-16 and remain steady and the reduced level. This minority report is attached to the end of the report back document.

- There are several initiatives within the Division of Forest Protection that collectively created a new plan for forest protection. Within that new plan for forest protection, the following initiatives were proposed to occur:
 - o Elimination of 2 District Ranger positions (Ref. # 376 on P22)
 - Voted OUT by the Committee, 8-1.
 - Elimination of 20 Forest Ranger II positions (Ref. # 377 on P22)
 - Voted OUT by the Committee, 9-0.
 - o Elimination of vacant Ranger Pilot position (Ref. # 398 & 399 P29, #427 P48)
 - Voted IN by Committee (but amended to keep Ranger Pilot position), 9-0.
 - Establishment of one Natural Resource Law Enforcement Officer Supervisor and 6 Natural Resource Law Enforcement Officer positions (Ref. #378 on P22)
 - Voted OUT by the Committee, 8-1.
 - Establishment of two Forest Ranger III positions (Ref. #379 and #380 on P23)
 - Voted OUT by the Committee, 10-0.
 - o Corresponding Language Part AA
 - Voted OUT by the Committee, 11-0.
 - Committee amendment Language Part AA-I
 - Voted IN by the Committee, 11-0.

The Committee has included amendments to various proposed changes in statutory language, as well as two language amendments that seek to statutorily establish some of the key decisions that were made throughout the course of our biennial budget work sessions. Justification:

The Public Facility for Boats Act provided that the Director of the Bureau of Parks and Public Lands "acquire, construct, and maintain, within funds available, public facilities for boats in the waters of the state" and provide a standardized state navigational marking system on the waters of the state. The non-lapsing revenue of the Boating Facilities Fund is derived from a 1.4437% allocation from gasoline tax revenue, less rebates to commercial boat operators and a 24.6% allocation to the Department of Marine Resources. Annual transfers to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife in the amount of \$150,000 are made to be used to match federal Sportfish Restoration Funds available to that agency. Supplemental federal funds are obtained from the National Park Service (Land and Water Conservation Fund) and the Land for Maine's Future Bond Fund, when available. The Boating Facilities Program has to date sponsored and assisted in the creation of: 141 state-owned and operated boating facilities and with grants to towns and others, 270 locally-owned and operated boating facilities; and marked 34 lakes with navigational aids.

The agency works to prevent wildland fires and prepares firefighters and equipment resources for wildfire control. 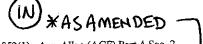

Forest Policy and Management (FP&M) develops the scientific data about Maine's forest that is used for informed decision making by elected officials, forest landowners and managers, forest products processors and marketers, and any other parties. FP&M provides technical assistance and education services to a wide array of audiences. The division implements the Forest Practices Act, providing outreach and enforcement services. They provide various reports on the state of Maine's forest resources and document the sustainability of our forests. The FP&M division has 4 primary functions: Forest Stewardship: The "Be Woods Wise" program encourages sound decisions by landowners. Forest Policy: Forest resource data is analyzed and published to fulfill statutory requirements and to inform policy makers and the public about the condition of and trends in Maine's forest. The Public Reserved Lands program is mandated to manage lands to "produce a sustained yield of products and services by use of prudent business practices" (Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 1847). Forest inventory data indicate annual harvest levels can be increased. Increased revenue can be generated from harvests by increasing the volume of wood harvested and actively marketing forest products to mills. The increased All Other expenses will fund additional contract costs for forest certification, current building rental rates, current Central Fleet Management rates, and increased repairs to roads and road construction needed to support additional timber harvest operations. 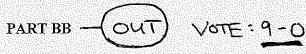

2-A. Retention of expired plan. The landowner must have access to a copy of an expired plan for a minimum of two years following the expiration of the plan to facilitate review by the municipal assessor, the State Tax Assessor, or the Bureau of Forestry.

Sec. BB-5. 36 MRSA, §574-B, sub-§3, as amended PL 2011, c.618, §2 is further amended by:

- 3. Transfer of ownership. When land taxed under this subchapter is transferred to a new owner, within one year of the date of transfer, the new landowner must file with the municipal assessor or the State Tax Assessor for land in the unorganized territory one of the following:
 - A. A sworn statement indicating that a new forest management and harvest plan has been prepared; or
 - B. A <u>sworn</u> statement from a licensed professional forester that the land is being managed in accordance with the plan prepared for the previous landowner.

Sec. BB-6. 36 MRSA, §575-A, sub-§2, as enacted by PL 2011, c.619, §1 is repealed and replaced by:

2. Random sampling and report. The Director of the Bureau of Forestry within the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry is authorized to conduct random sampling of land enrolled under this subchapter to identify any differences in compliance with forest management and harvest plans based on location or type of parcel and to assess individual landowner and overall compliance with the requirements of this subchapter. For the purposes of this subsection, the Director of the Bureau of Forestry or the director's designee may:

A. With appropriate notification to the landowner, enter and examine forest land for the purpose of determining compliance with the forest management and harvest plan pursuant to section 574-B;

- B. Request and review a forest management and harvest plan required under section 574-B, which must be provided by a landowner or the landowner's agent upon request; and

Sec. BB-7. 36 MRSA, §578, sub-§1, ¶¶ D and E, are enacted to read:

1. Organized areas. The municipal assessors or chief assessor of a primary assessing area shall adjust the State Tax Assessor's 100% valuation per acre for each forest type of their county by whatever ratio, or percentage of current just value, is applied to other property within the municipality to obtain the assessed values. Forest land in the organized areas, subject to taxation under this subchapter, must be taxed at the property tax rate applicable to other property in the municipality.

The State Tax Assessor shall determine annually the amount of acreage in each municipality that is classified and taxed in accordance with this subchapter. Each municipality is entitled to annual payments distributed in accordance with this section from money appropriated by the Legislature if it submits an annual return in accordance with section 383 and if it achieves the minimum assessment ratio established in section 327. For purposes of this section, "classified forest lands" means forest lands classified pursuant to this subchapter as well as all areas identified as forested land within farmland parcels that are transferred from tree growth classification pursuant to section 1112 on or after October 1, 2011. For the purposes of this section, the tax lost is the tax that would have been assessed, but for this subchapter, on the classified forest lands if they were assessed according to the undeveloped acreage valuations used in the state valuation then in effect, or according to the current local valuation on undeveloped acreage, whichever is less, minus the tax that was actually assessed on the same lands in accordance with this subchapter, and adjusted for the aggregate municipal savings in required educational costs attributable to reduced state valuation. A municipality that fails to achieve the minimum assessment ratio established in section 327 loses 10% of the reimbursement provided by this section for each one percentage point the minimum assessment ratio falls below the ratio established in section 327.

The State Tax Assessor shall adopt rules necessary to implement the provisions of this section. Rules adopted pursuant to this subsection are routine technical rules for the purposes of Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

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C. The State Tax Assessor shall distribute reimbursement under this section to each municipality in proportion to the product of the reduced tree growth valuation of the municipality multiplied by the property tax burden of the municipality. For purposes of this paragraph, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

- (1) "Property tax burden" means the total real and personal property taxes assessed in the most recently completed municipal fiscal year, except the taxes assessed on captured value within a tax increment financing district, divided by the latest state valuation certified to the Secretary of State.
- (2) "Undeveloped land" means rear acreage and unimproved nonwaterfront acreage that is not:
 - (a) Classified under the laws governing current use valuation set forth in chapter 105, subchapter 2-A, 10 or 10-A;

- (3) "Average value of undeveloped land" means the per acre undeveloped land valuations used in the state valuation then in effect, or according to the current local valuation on undeveloped land as determined for state valuation purposes, whichever is less.
- (4) "Reduced tree growth valuation" means the difference between the average value of undeveloped land and the average value of tree growth land times the total number of acres classified as forest land under this subchapter plus the total number of acres of forest land that is transferred from tree growth classification to farmland classification pursuant to section 1112 on or after October 1, 2011.
- D. The State Tax Assessor shall reduce reimbursement for one year to a municipality that fails to file a timely report to the Bureau of Forestry as required pursuant to section 581-G. The amount of reduction shall be equal to \$5,000 or 10% of the reimbursement, whichever is greater.

The State Tax Assessor shall reduce reimbursement for one year to a municipality that fails to act in a timely manner upon a determination provided by the Bureau of Forestry pursuant to section 581. The amount of reduction shall be equal to \$5,000 or 10% of the reimbursement, whichever is greater.

Those schedules may be required at such other times as the assessor may designate upon 120 days' written notice.

The assessor shall determine whether the land is subject to valuation and taxation under this subchapter and shall classify the land as to forest type.

The assessor, or the assessor's duly authorized representative, or licensed foresters in the employ of the Bureau of Forestry may enter and examine the forest lands under this subchapter and may examine any information submitted by the owner or owners. A copy of

the forest management and harvest plan required under section 574-B must be available to the assessor to review upon request and to the Director of the Bureau of Forestry within the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry or the director's designee to review upon request-when the assessor seeks assistance in accordance with section 575-A and to the Director of the Bureau of Forestry within the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry or the director's designee upon request. For the purposes of this paragraph, "to review" means to see or possess a copy of a plan for a reasonable amount of time to verify that the plan exists or to facilitate an evaluation as to whether the plan is appropriate and is being followed. Upon completion of the review, the plan must be returned to the owner or an agent of the owner. A forest management and harvest plan provided in accordance with this section is confidential and is not a public record as defined in Title 1, section 402, subsection 3.

Upon notice in writing by certified mail, return receipt requested, or by another method that provides actual notice, any owner or owners shall appear before the assessor, at such reasonable time and place as the assessor may designate and answer questions or interrogatories the assessor considers necessary to obtain material information about those lands.

If the owner or owners of any parcel of forest land subject to valuation under this subchapter fails to submit the schedules as provided under this section or fails to provide information after notice duly received as provided under this section, such owner or owners are deemed to have waived all rights of appeal pursuant to section 583 for that property tax year, except for the determination that the land is subject to valuation under this subchapter.

It is the obligation of the owner or owners to report to the assessor any change of use or change of forest type of land subject to valuation under this subchapter.

If the owner or owners fail to report to the assessor a change of use as required by the foregoing paragraph, the assessor shall assess the taxes that should have been paid, shall assess the penalty provided in section 581 and shall assess an additional penalty equal to 25% of the penalty provided in section 581. The assessor may waive the additional penalty for cause.

For the purposes of this section, the acts of owners specified in this section may be taken by an authorized agent of an owner.

1. Assessor determination; owner request. Justification:

The Public Reserved Lands program is mandated to manage lands to "produce a sustained yield of products and services by use of prudent business practices" (Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 1847). Forest inventory data indicate annual harvest levels can be increased. Increased revenue can be generated by actively marketing forest products to mills, not to exceed an average of 141,500 cords per year over a two year period from harvests by increasing the volume of wood harvested and actively marketing forest products to mills. The increased All Other expenses will fund additional contract costs for forest certification, current building rental rates, current Central Fleet Management rates, and increased repairs to roads and road construction needed to support additional timber harvest operations. The capital funds will allow for the purchase of capital construction materials and the improvement to bridges and structures on Public Reserved Lands needed to support expanded timber harvesting operations and to maintain recreation trails and sites used by the public.

SUMMARY

This section limits timber harvesting on public reserved lands and nonreserved public lands to an average of 141,500 cords per year over any two year period, which is the sustainable harvesting level determined by an independent timber inventory conducted in 2012. This section allows the department by rule, based on an independent timber inventory conducted after July 1, 2015, to establish a different sustainable harvest level. The rules are major substantive rules and must be reviewed by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over public reserved and nonreserved lands.

The director, when appointed or while in office, may not be directly or indirectly concerned in the acquisition of any interest in land owned by the State or any of its political subdivisions except in an official capacity. In exercising powers and duties, the director shall:

1. Administration. Administer all functions of the bureau, including but not limited to, the management of state parks and historic sites, public reserved lands, nonreserved public lands, submerged lands and intertidal zones, and the Allagash Wilderness Waterway, and adopt methods of administration that are determined necessary to render the office efficient;

SUMMARY

This amendment clarifies the powers and duties of the director of the Bureau of Parks and Public Lands.
