In one fell swoop affected farmers are facing the loss of livelihood, while also having to contemplate whether they feel safe even staying on their land. Where will they get their drinking water? But this should not be their burden to bear. They need help navigating out of the situation that was created decades ago by state sanctioned spreading of industrial sludge/septage on agricultural land.
