In the three years since 2018, and the fully unanimous passing and funding support of LD 1845 by the 128th Maine Legislature, Maine's fire services community has worked diligently to reverse the severe lack of National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) compliant fire training infrastructure for Maine.

The collaborative efforts of Maine firefighters, our professional associations, instructors, town officials, Maine Fire Services Institute and the Southern Maine Community College have been nothing short of commendable. Every penny of the funding and grant awards was completely used for the repair, replacement, or construction of NFPA compliant Live Fire Training Facilities.
