TESTIMONY OF BRENDAN MCQUADE Ought to Pass—LD 1278

An Act to End the Maine Information and Analysis Center

Submitted to the

JOINTING STANDING COMMITTEE ON CRIMINAL JUSTICE AND PUBLIC SAFETY

April 12, 2021

Senator Deschambault, Representative Warren and distinguished members of the Joint Standing Committee on Criminal Justice and Public Safety, good morning. My name is Brendan McQuade. I am an assistant professor in the criminology department at the University of Southern Maine and the author of the only academic book on fusion centers. My employer takes no position on this subject. I am speaking as an expert on fusion centers and, on this basis, I urge you to support LD 1278.

The failures of fusion centers are well established. For years, reports from non-partisan government auditors, civil libertarian organizations, and the U.S. Senate Permanent Committee on Investigations have all documented the problems and abuses fusion centers.² Last summer, these problems made headlines in Maine when scandals related to a whistleblower complaint and the BlueLeaks hacks put an uncomfortable spotlight on the MIAC. While there is much I would like to cover today, I am going to focus on the way the MIAC harms people by criminalizing them. Put differently, the

MIAC is part of a larger system that manages social problems like poverty, homelessness, and untreated mental health issues with police and prisons.

On March 17, 2021, DPS Commissioner Michael Sauschuck shared several documents with this committee, detailing incidents where the MIAC provided analytic support or disseminated information about wanted suspects or threatening people. From his perspective, these incidents prove the worth of the MIAC. From my perspective, these documents are testaments to our overdeveloped systems of imprisonment and policing. Fusion centers are the nervous system of mass incarceration. What DPS calls effective information sharing is also mass criminalization. For every document shared by DPS, there are others that show how the MIAC presents people struggling with homelessness, mental illness, or substance use disorder as dangerous threats.³

Appended to this comment, I have included a different selection of documents detailing those unfortunate souls that got caught in the MIAC's digital dragnet. These documents are evidence of institutional failures. Instead of proactively helping struggling people, we punish them, effectively blaming individuals for our collective inability to care for each other. More than half of all incarcerated people have untreated mental health issues: 56 percent of state prisoners, 45 percent of federal prisoners, and 64 percent of jail inmates. Between one quarter and one half people killed by police suffer from severe psychiatric diseases. The MIAC and other fusion centers are part of this problem.

Instead of fearing our criminalized sisters and brothers, we should start building a society in which authoritarianism, coercion, and fear do not play a major role in governance. As you know, experts, advocates, and affected communities have been calling for a different approach to public safety one centered meeting needs not criminalizing behaviors. Here I encourage you think of LD 1278 alongside other bills under consideration this legislation session that would decriminalize drug possession, cut the budget of the MDEA in half to fund community-based drug treatment, and close Long Creek, among other proposals. This is an opportunity to take bold action and set a new agenda. I hope you will rise to the occasion and pass this first-in-the-nation proposal to close a fusion center.

Addendum to Testimony of Brendan McQuade Selection of MIAC Documents

Blueleaks flooded the public record with 2961 documents hacked from the MIAC website. There are 1384 documents either produced by Maine's fusion center or labeled "pass through," meaning that the MIAC shared the item with at least some of their 4,526 registered users. Two-thirds of these documents definitely shared with MIAC—939 of 1,382—are (1) requests to identify a suspect or a wanted person, locate a person of interest or missing person, or provide information about possible crime or suspicious circumstances or (2) bulletins and reports on specific incidents, cases, or individuals considered relevant to law enforcement but not directly connected to a criminal investigation by a law enforcement agency in Maine. Add in the 147 cancellations and updates that follow up on requests for information and similar notices sent out by MIAC and nearly 80 percent of the documents created or shared by the MIAC concern the sharing of criminal information.

These documents are snapshots of mass criminalization. Individually, each one is a fragment of a larger, incomplete story. Together, they reveal a coherent pattern: the punitive regulation of social problems through policing and surveillance.

Undoubtedly, all of these examples involve either interpersonal or self-harm. They detail real suffering but they do so in way that individualizes the problem as criminal stigma. Rather than viewing these peoples as dangers to public order, we should see them as people failed by our underdeveloped systems for public health, mental health and general welfare and our overdeveloped systems of punishment and policing. Some examples:

- An August 9, 2018 "Situational Awareness" report warns of a "resident with possible mental health concerns" that "may pose threat to public safety." The documents notes that it is likely that individual "is not complying with his prescribed medication. Caution should be used when interacting with him as he has made several homicidal and suicidal comments."
- An August 31, 2018 "Officer Safety" bulletin alerts officers to an "Armed...Maine (ME) resident living in the woods...reportedly suffering from mental health issues." The document explains that family members suspect that the individual suffers from Huntington Disease. Two members of the individual's immediate family had already passed from the progressive and fatal genetic brain disorder that impairs the ability to reason, walk, and speak.
- A October 23, 2018 "Officer Safety" bulletin warns that a "Transient Maine (ME) resident with history of mental health issues as well as violent and threatening behavior makes threat to southern ME law enforcement officers; may pose risk to greater law enforcement community." The document notes that the individual "has been diagnosed with schizophrenia, bi-polar disorder, and manic depression," has not consistently taken their medication and has history of "suicidal ideation" and "crisis evaluations and psychiatric hospitalization."
- A November 9, 2018, "Situational Awareness" bulletin describes a "transient with extensive criminal history, gang affiliation and mental health issues." The report notes that individual "has been staying at a homeless shelter" and is believed to struggle with "mental health issues, as he recently reported that the National Security Agency (NSA) implanted a microchip inside of him."
- A January 31, 2019 "Situational Awareness bulletin warns of "potentially armed and mentally unstable subject" that "was 'acting crazy' and was heavily involved in drug trade as well as drug use."

- A March 19, 2019 "Situational Awareness" report describes a Maine "resident with possible PTSD has reportedly made threats to law enforcement."
- A September 12, 2019 "Situational Awareness" report that details a Maine resident "with mental health issues" that "admitted to having auditory hallucinations that told him to shoot at school." The individual believes to have "been implanted with a 'signal wave/data signal' device that was related to terrorism." The bulletin notes that individual has no prior criminal history and is currently under bail conditions included curfew and weekly reports to the Sheriff's Office.
- A November 21, 2019 "Officer Safety" bulletin which details the circumstances of Maine resident with "possible mental health issues." He was stopped by a Maine State Police officer who noted that he "displayed manic behavior and his mood fluctuated frequently." He was driving with expired plates and a revoked license. The state police towed his car and issued a summons.
- A February 1, 2019 "Information Alert" from the Auburn Police Department "passed through" by the MIAC details the situation of a "couch-surfing transient" with "several mental health issues (including his own claims of being bi-polar) and is off his medication(s)." The report notes that the individual "has manic episodes / active periods for law enforcement involvements and is easily angered / prone to enraged outbursts" and "may not sleep for long periods of time. Now being homeless, [the individual] may spend a lot of his time driving around."
- A March 7, 2019 "Attempt to Locate" requests "assistance in locating a dangerous suspect involved in multiple criminal violations." The individual violated a protection from abuse order. The document notes that the individual is a known runner from police and has made numerous suicide by cop statements to family and friends and that he would not be 'taken alive.'" Despite this intelligence, the Maine State Police sent their tactical team to bring the individual into custody in a 2 AM raid on the home of the suspect's mother. In the subsequent confrontation, the individual shot himself in the head.¹
- April 3, 2020 "Officer Safety" bulletin that warns of "An identified Maine transient with a violent criminal history and mental health illness." The report includes summaries account how the individual's "mental health illness has led to multiple encounters with law enforcement" over several years.






