




Figure 2. National Drug-Involved Overdose Deaths\*, Number Among All Ages, 1999-2019

America is 5% of the world's population but 25% of the prison population. 64% of the prison population suffers from mental illness of which substance use disorder is a subset.







LD1035 will not necessarily target the right people as well as result in needless incarceration that does not serve it purpose of rehabilitation. We are not treating people in prison. We are not solving our opioid crisis. This is one step in the right direction.
