Learning this history is the only way I can begin to help build a better way forward, away from the continuation of colonialist ideology and unethical treatment of Indigenous people, and towards working collectively for a more just society. I also believe that myself and other non-Indigenous people of Maine have the chance to improve our environmental sustainability and connection to place by incorporating Indigenous points of view into our common thought. This change must begin at the root of the issue: by teaching accurate, culturally appropriate Wabanaki Studies. It is essential that these courses are engaging and culturally appropriate, and for this we need resources and proper training for teachers. I therefore urge the committee to pass LD 1645, in order to provide funding and proper training for the teaching of Wabanaki Studies in Maine schools.
