Please listen closely to what Natural Resources Council of Maine has gathered for evidence in support of this bill.

Please do not consider LD 1471, as it appears to be just a delaying tactic - the policy it outlines is not comprehensive, not viable, not transformational, and doesn't do much of anything to resolve the problem of our accumulating and non-biodegradable waste.
