I am writing to you today in support of L.D. 101 an act to prohibit all offshore wind developments Maine State waters, including the Monhegan project. I as a fisherman and a person whom values nature and believe that we need to do everything we can to protect our environment to the best of our ability. As we all know every choice we make for power generation will create an impact, but I believe better choices are available now that create less impact. Industrializing the Gulf of Maine in any way in my view is extremely short sighted, it seems as though we are rushing to get this done because there is a sense of a huge financial windfall that's being promoted by our government as well as the developers whom stand to gain the most from a project like this. I would like to state that I would support these projects if I felt it was truly in the best interest of the people of the State of Maine and all of New England and I feel many other fishermen would too. But the negatives far out weigh the positives in this case especially given we have other choices to arrive at the same outcome. We should value the food source that cannot be replaced that the Gulf of Maine has represented since before the birth of our nation over the generation of power and all the unknowns that come with it. I believe that by making the right choice here and investing the money that's being invested in wind power that's slated for the Gulf of Maine we can achieve a much better fit for the environment and all of us that depend on it.
