RE: L.D. 1115, An Act to Improve Access to HIV Prevention Medications

Dear Senator Sanborn, Representative Tepler, and Members of the Committee:

The Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation ("OPOR") is neither for nor against LD 1115, but offers the following information as it may be useful for the Committee's consideration of this bill.

This bill is similar to one that was recently before the California Legislature (California Senate Bill 159). The California bill, signed into law in October 2019, allows California pharmacists who complete a training program to furnish 30 to 60 days of pre-exposure prophylaxis (commonly referred to as "PrEP") or a full course of post-exposure prophylaxis (commonly referred to as "PEP") to patients if they receive counseling on the drug's effects and an HIV test.

L.D. 1115 similarly proposes adding a new section to the Maine Pharmacy Act to authorize pharmacists who undergo board-approved training to dispense HIV prevention drugs, pursuant to a standing order or protocols adopted by rule by the Board of Pharmacy ("Board"). The bill would allow pharmacists to dispense (i) a maximum of a 60-day supply of PrEP to a single patient once every two years without a doctor's prescription, and (ii) a complete course of PEP, meant to be used in an emergency after possible exposure to the virus, to a patient without prescription.

It is already well within a pharmacist's scope of practice to *dispense* these drugs and to counsel patients accordingly, as with any prescription medication. The distinction is that this bill directs the Board to establish standards for authorizing pharmacists to dispense these drugs <u>without</u> a prescription. However, a prescription is <u>required</u> to dispense any prescription medication.
